

Rated Among Unofficial Advisers Of Diefenbaker

OTTAWA (CP)—The men who are the closest advisers of John Diefenbaker are a blend of youth and age and of experience in many fields of politics and business.

Nobody dictates policy to Canada's prime minister; he is as likely to ask for advice from an elevator operator as from an economic expert, and then make his own decision. But he has around him a group of key persons who undoubtedly swing an influence in his political thinking.

Apartment from top cabinet members who have worked intimately with the new government chief for years, the major advisor appears to be Allister Grosart, a 50-year-old Toronto public relations man who did most of the down-to-earth thinking in stage-managing Mr. Diefenbaker's campaigns for both the party leadership and the election.

GOING TO OTTAWA
The sandy haired Mr. Grosart, native of Dublin who has worked on several Canadian newspapers and in radio, did his job so adroitly that at the prime minister's request he is selling out his substantial interest in McKim's advertising agency to move to Ottawa as a permanent Diefenbaker lieutenant.

Just how he will operate here is uncertain now, but he could become national director of the party or could move into the East Block with Mr. Diefenbaker in some advisory capacity.

Mr. Grosart also handled public relations for Hon. George Drew in his successful 1948 national leadership campaign, worked on public relations for the Conservatives in their 1949 and 1953 federal election campaigns and was in charge of public relations for Ontario Premier Frost in his last two provincial elections.

Associates say Mr. Grosart was mainly responsible for thinking up some of the policies which they declare were largely helpful in bringing the Conservatives home with the largest group in the Commons.

RECONCILED BALCER?
It was believed to be Mr. Grosart who brought about a reconciliation between Mr. Diefenbaker and Leon Balcer, MP for Trois-Rivieres and national president of the party, who had led a Quebec revolt against Mr. Diefenbaker at the leadership convention. Mr. Balcer wound up in the Diefenbaker cabinet as solicitor-general.

Among the parliamentarians who obtained cabinet posts last week, the closest to Mr. Diefenbaker is believed to be Maj. Gen. G. R. Pearkes, V.C., who became defence minister. About as influential as any other is Mr. J. B. Brown, secretary of the party.

mate, probably, are Gordon Churchill, of Winnipeg, South Centre and George Hees of Toronto-Broadview, the new trade and transport ministers, respectively. All three played a big part in putting Mr. Diefenbaker over at the convention and in the election.

OTHER PR ADVISERS
George Johnston of Toronto, senior member of a public relations consulting firm and an old friend of the new prime minister, has been close to him during and since the election campaign. Mr. Johnston did a considerable amount of travelling with the leader during the campaign.

Another public relations expert who had a key role in the campaign was Dalton Camp, an executive in a Toronto advertising firm and former party director of public relations and, oddly enough, onetime secretary to former Liberal J. B. McNair of New Brunswick.

Soft-spoken Mr. Camp was given general charge of the Diefenbaker campaign in the Maritimes, and his professional touch is generally conceded to have played a large part in the exceptional showing the Conservatives made in the seaboard provinces June 10.

Some of the others close to Mr. Diefenbaker:

Rod Finlayson, a veteran political strategist who has been in the party's Ottawa office as adviser to Conservative leaders since the time of Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett in the 1930s. His specialty is parliamentary procedure.

George Hogan, youthful owner of an automobile agency in Toronto. He had charge of Mr. Diefenbaker's travelling arrangements during his breakneck election tour:

Merrill Menzies, a doctor of philosophy and an economic consultant, who joined Mr. Diefenbaker's travelling troupe as research assistant.

QUEBEC LINEUP
In Quebec, Mr. Diefenbaker's closest lieutenants have been William Hamilton, MP for Montreal Notre-Dame-de-Grace and the new postmaster-general; Mr. Balcer; Col. Pierre Sevigny, defeated in Montreal Longueuil; Jean Morin, provincial party treasurer; Mark Drouin, chairman of the Quebec district advisory committee, and Guillaume Piette, chairman of the Quebec district association.

Mr. Hamilton had charge of operations in seven largely English-speaking ridings. Mr. Balcer took charge of about 25 seats. The Conservatives won eight in Quebec, doubling their previous Commons representation.

No one was stung, but Mr. Austin suggested if there was a sting, "Just pull out the stinger—fast." The stinger is about 1-1/8th of an inch long, topped by a tiny poison sac. The poison which causes swelling goes into the body from the sac through the stinger if left in the skin.

"Don't grab at the sting or you'll squeeze the sac, injecting the poison just like a hypodermic needle," Mr. Austin said. "Scratch it out. We usually keep one fingernail long enough for the job."

DISPROVE THEORY
So far, the federal bee keepers have been able to shatter the theory that a queen bee mates only once.

"They mate an average of seven times," said Dr. Jamieson. The queen has 250 colonies with about 75,000 bees to a colony.

Scientists at the experimental farm station here and at other federal farms across the country are studying the problems of pollination and disease as well as the habits of the bee. Research is also being done on a tougher type of bee for colder climates.

Dr. Jamieson was born on a farm near Barrie, Ont., and graduated from the Ontario Agricultural College, Macdonald College and Cornell University. He has been with the bee division since 1938 and director since 1949.

STUDYING DISEASES
Specializing in the diseases of adult bees, especially the queen, he is collecting queen bees from across the country for research.

One arrived by mail during the interview in a container about half the size of a package of cigarettes, complete with candy and worker bees to feed the queen.

"I have to kill these," said Dr. Jamieson as the workers buzzed frenziedly and the queen was dropped in a jar of alcohol, to kill and preserve her.

He couldn't put them with colonies outside the building because the "guard" bees would kill them as "strangers" anyway. Bees guarding entrances to colonies pounce on bees from other colonies the minute they try to enter.

EASY REMEDY
