Mount Stewart To Take Plebiscite Re Incorporation

A large and representative gathering of the residents of Mount Stewart held in the Legion Hall last evening unanimously agreed to request incorporation with the village that Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources put the machinery in operation to call a plebiscite as required under the law at an early date.

Mr. Claude Smith, director of town planning and Mr. T. Arthur Campbell, Provincial Fire Marshal, each addressed the meeting explaining the advantages and responsibilities of such incorporation. Messrs. Earle Jay, Harry MacKay and Mr. Doyle were appointed a committee to deal with the preliminaries and confer with the Sheriff regarding the same. Mr. Earle Jay was voted to the chair by the meeting and Mr. James McGurk acted as secretary.
