

Strengthened Glace Bay Team Halts Millionaires' Winning Streak At Sydney

SYDNEY, Nov. 10 (CP) — Glace Bay Miners halted Sydney Millionaires' bid for co-leadership of the Maritime Major Hockey League here tonight before a small crowd of 1,331 downing the Moneybags 5-1. It was the first win for Miners over Millionaires this season.

Johnny Morrow scored the only Sydney goal midway through the third period, ruining Don Lockhart's shutout bid.

Boosted by the return of playing-coach Hub Macey and the addition of Johnny Raynak, former Shawinigan Falls' player, Miners played a strong two-way game. They used only two lines against Mills' three, outskating them most of the time.

Henry "Pop" Backer led the Glace Bay scoring with a pair and singles went to Gordie Miller, Don Keiler and Lloyd Hinchberger.

Glace Bay took a 1-0 lead in the first period, but it was to 3-0 in the second and made it 4-0 early in the third. Then Morrow came through with the lone Sydney goal. Shortly after, Hinchberger scored for Glace Bay.

Umpire Takes Crack At New York Yankees

BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 10 (AP) — Larry Goetz, outspoken veteran umpire of the National Baseball League, said today New York Yankees "won the crying championship even before they won the World Series."

Goetz said in an interview: "Everywhere I go, guys ask me about that play on first base that Art Passarella made calling a Yankee out. So an umpire made a mistake. Passarella didn't cry about it. Photos later indicated Passarella erred on the call.

"But those Yankees cried. They have been the crying team in the business this year. They won the crying championship even before they won the World Series.

"As for the crying, why those Yankees played the worst fielding series I ever saw, and I've been in the National League 18 years.

"They should spend a little more time crying about their errors and sharpen up their game. That would help. No umpire can help 'em."

Then Goetz grinned and added that the Yanks "probably would win again next year."

Four Durrelle Brothers Enlist In Canadian Army

NEWCASTLE, N. B., Nov. 10 (CP) — From now on the four Durrelle brothers of nearby Baie St. Anne will do their fighting for the Canadian army. They joined today.

Yvon, 23, leading contender for the Canadian middleweight boxing title held by Roy Wouters of Vancouver and Montreal, and Eloi, 21, a comer in welterweight circles, joined the Provost Corps.

Alyre, 34, and Ernest, 24—neither are fighters although Alyre served overseas during the Second World War—enlisted with the service corps and hope to go to Germany.

This was the case in 1948 when they won the N. B.-P. E. I. Intercollegiate Hockey Championship. The Nova Scotians were about two weeks late in declaring a winner due to a delay in the play-offs between St. P. X. and Acadia. In the meantime the Saints lost the use of the ice at the College rink and came time for the Maritime play-offs they were out of condition.

IN THIS CORNER

Today we wish to salute the Charlottetown Abbies football team the never-say-die effort they made against Saint John Mariners in the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island senior rugby play-downs. The Abbies came off Memorial Field Saturday evening as the losers in the struggle for the two-province football championship but they weren't the losers in the game they had just played. They tied the Mariners 3-3 in a well-played spirited contest but that wasn't good enough to overcome the fourteen point lead which the Mariners built up in Saint John during the opening game of the series more than a week ago.

We feel proud to congratulate those players who wore the red and black on Saturday afternoon. They went into the final game knowing that they were facing almost impossible odds and it's a credit to them that they fought from whistle to whistle in attempting to erase those odds. That they didn't is no fault of theirs for they were facing a powerful team. They did succeed, however, in giving fans a great football game and earning for themselves a lot of admiration.

Actually those players have been facing heavy odds since the start of the season. Practically all of them are working men who could practise only after or before their day's work. Several weeks ago darkness eliminated their chance to practise in the evening with the result that the boys had to hold their workouts in the early morning hours. While those practices had the desired effect of rounding the players into shape we can imagine that they cost one a lot of effort which might be termed over and above the line of duty.

And while condition is a big percentage of your football game isn't the whole formula for success. Players need some one to practise against and this is where the Abewit Club suffered their let-down. At the first of the season they were able to scrimmage against Prince of Wales College but in late weeks they had only a dozen of their own players to work with and against. Under these conditions it was impossible to expect them to win any Maritime Championships.

Perhaps in another year conditions will be changed somewhat. They may be able to use enough lighting power on Victoria Field to hold their practise sessions at night. And if that is the case they will have plenty of football players for a senior and intermediate team and thus be assured of practice opponents. The rugged practices between the Saint Dunstan's first and second teams this year no doubt accounted for considerable success of the Saints this season.

Big Squeeze On For Rose Bowl Finalists In U. S.

CHICAGO, Nov. 10 (AP) — The big squeeze is on in the Big Ten this week as the struggle for the football championship and Rose Bowl trip enters the semifinal stage.

With only two games to go before the upset-harassed season ends Nov. 22, four teams remain as contenders in what has become one of the most unpredictable wind-ups in Big Ten history.

With ties a possibility, the issue is still out on the limb.

Purdue is still ahead after the conference's week-end. Minnesota, fought Boilermakers to a 14-14 standstill Saturday. Those two teams plus Wisconsin and Michigan make up the Big Four in the bunched showdown.

The middle may be cleared this Saturday at Ann Arbor when Purdue clashes with Michigan. A victory for Boilermakers would just about give them the crown and Rose Bowl assignment.

But Purdue must close out Nov. 22 against Indiana in a traditional rivalry that has been rife with upsets in the past.

Michigan whose 3-1 league record matches Wisconsin, is ready to go all-out against Purdue. The Wolverines breezed over Cornell 41-14 in an inter-sectional breather Saturday.

Wisconsin invades Indiana Saturday and figure to win despite their score in snatching a 24-29 decision from eighth-place Northwestern.

Eskimos Meet Blue Bombers In Final Today

WINNIPEG, Nov. 10 (CP) — The so-called experts have been selling the Edmonton Eskimos short, and Frank Fitzke's unpredictable team is making them at their words.

Eskimos probably won't be any worse than 6-5 underdogs short-odds of the series — when they meet Winnipeg Blue Bombers here tomorrow afternoon in what now is a sudden-death final for the Western football crown.

Eskimos Saturday downed the favored Bombers 18-12 to force the third and deciding game in the best-of-three playoff, with the winner to represent the West in the Grey Cup final at Toronto Nov. 29.

After their smashing 28-12 victory in the opener at Edmonton, Nov. 1, Bombers were quoted as high as 4-1 to make it two straight Winnipeg ranged from 7-5 to 8-5 favorites in the first game.

In five meetings this year during the regular schedule, the clubs won two apiece and tied one, and only in one contest was there more than six points difference in the scores.

Eskimos tied 14-14, won 11-9 and lost 18-40 in Winnipeg, and split on two games at home, winning 18-12 and losing 18-21.

Eskimos who haven't hit the Grey Cup final in 30 years, go best with their backs to the wall as witnessed Saturday and also a couple of weeks ago when they came back from a 19-point deficit to edge Calgary Stampeders 42-38 in a two-game, total-point semifinal.

The weather man called for milder temperatures for game time. The mercury is expected to climb to 40 above from freezing week-end levels.
