Local Man Serving at Arctic Radio Station

OTTAWA — All of them volunteers, 19 men of the Royal Canadian Navy will go north this summer to begin a year of service at the radio station on Fadoping Island on the east coast of Baffin Island.

They will replace RCN personnel who took over operation of the Arctic station last September from the United States Air Force and are now completing their year's tour of duty.

The station was established during the Second World War by the U. S. Air Force with the approval of the Canadian government. Its purpose is the gathering and transmission of weather data.

The RCN mans the Arctic station at present, but eventually it will be taken over by the Department of Transport, which will be responsible for its operation. The volunteer replacements hail from points in Canada extending from Vernon, B. C., to St. John's, Nfld.

Petty Officer Aubrey J. Smyth, of St. John's, a communications specialist, will be officer in charge of the station. The others include Petty Officer John J. Cook, Charlottetown.

(CP)—Richard Desjardins, 22, died in hospital here Friday of injuries suffered in a 100-foot fall down the shaft of a polybedrite mine at Lacorne, 50 miles west of this northwestern Quebec town. Jet Fighters For Reserve Squadron

OTTAWA, (CP)—Defence Minister Claxton Monday night said the RCAF hopes this year to make an experiment of equipping a reserve force squadron with jet fighters. He said in the Commons in reply to Ft. Lt. Walter Dinsdale, PC-Brandon-Souris that the main job of equipping reserve squadrons with these late-model fighter planes will get under way in 1955.

This year an experiment would be made in equipping one squadron. The complexity of the problems probably would make it necessary that half the personnel of the reserve squadron be permanent force airmen.

Special Meeting Of City Council

At a special meeting of the City Council called to consider the purchase of a road grader and scarifier, His Worship Mayor Stewart and seven of the Councillors were present. Councillor E. C. Johnston was absent from the meeting.

On motion of Coun. McCormac, chairman of the street committee, it was moved that the City purchase a second hand machine from A. Pickard and Company for the sum of \$5,000 plus the trade in on the present machine which is too light for the duties required of it.

His Worship called attention to the fact that the machine was one that the Government had had for two years and could not get rid of. He was not in favor of the purchase. Several councillors entered into the discussion and while they were not generally in favor of the purchase of a used machine, it was pointed out that a machine was needed immediately and the value of one of the type proposed was \$20,000 with snow plow attached.

When the vote was taken all Councillors present gave their consent to the purchase. Coun. A. Gormley introduced a motion calling for the installation of two sets of traffic lights by the Redmond Electric Company to be installed at the corners of Queen and Euston Streets, and Prince and Grafton Streets. This company installed the first traffic lights placed in the City and since that time it has been the practice to have the same firm install any additional lights. It is the duty of the contractor to service the lights after they are put into operation.

Councillor MacDonald opposed the motion on the grounds that the Redmond Electric Company, which was no longer a city firm, its business is now located outside the limits. He also recalled a previous resolution in which it was unanimously agreed that in all cases contracts would be given to city firms who were able to do the work.

Councillor MacDonald felt that it was unfair to local firms who are paying high taxes to be ignored when such work was to be contracted for.

Mayor Stewart reminded the Council that in allowing outside firms work within the city they were leaving themselves open to trouble on future occasions. The resolution carried 4-3. Voting for the motion were Councillors McCormac, Gaudet, Gormley and Hutcheson, against were Councillors MacDonald, Keefe and Rogers.

TWINS SENTENCED
LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Finn twins, George and Charles, 40, were sentenced Monday to a year in jail for what Federal Judge Edward Murphy called their "utter disregard of the due process of law" in making a "citizen's arrest" of a United States attorney. The twins handcuffed U.S. attorney Laughlin E. Waters as he left a hotel last Jan. 21. The "arrest" they said, was to bring to public attention a long, involved fight with the government over possession of an airplane.

Found Both Drivers Equally Negligent

A jury found the two drivers equally negligent in a case before the Supreme Court Monday. Mr. Justice M. R. MacGuigan presided. The case was that of Rawleigh MacRae of Charlottetown and Dartmouth, plaintiff vs. Hinson Hughes, Harrington, defendant. It concerned a collision between the plaintiff's car and the defendant's truck at the corner of Fitzroy and Edward Streets on Nov. 15, 1952.

Knud Jorgensen was fined \$10 for not appearing when summoned as a juror. The jury was composed as follows: Arthur Vessey, foreman, Ivan McNevin, Bernard MacPherson, Stanley Hyde, Frank Hodey, John Cameron and Melbourne McEachern.

Mr. J. P. Nicholson, counsel for the plaintiff called Robert McConnell, and the plaintiff, Mr. R. R. Bell, Q. C., who with Mr. G. R. Foster acted for the defendant, called Hilson Hughes and James Heron. After argument by counsel the jury retired and returned in fifty minutes.

Their verdict was: "We find the plaintiff 50 per cent negligent and the defendant 50 per cent negligent, and find the plaintiff's damages at \$482.00 and the defendant's at \$196.50. The case was adjourned until June 28th, when the matter of costs will be determined.

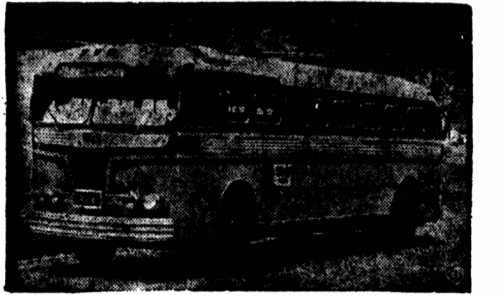

Reserve Judgment In Test Case

OTTAWA (CP)—The Exchequer Court of Canada Tuesday reserved judgment in a test case involving rates of pay for federal employees at Newfoundland's Gander airport. The action arose out of a claim by Chesley Samson, a carpenter employed by the federal transport department's air services branch, that he was not paid at a rate comparable to departmental rates in other parts of the country.
