Scout News and Notices

Boy Scout Toy repair shops are again being operated across Canada this year and will bring happiness to many children who might otherwise go giftless this Christmas. In some cities the Scouts are cooperating with local firemen in the annual good turn effort.

Percy Penn, 8, of Orillia, Ontario recently lost both legs when run over by a train while playing. A fund is being raised on his behalf and the Wolf Cubs are helping too. They've presented Percy with a uniform and welcomed him into the Cubs which Percy had "always wanted to join". (The Cub joining age is 8 years).

At the Col. Belcher Hospital in Calgary, Scouts of the 37th North Hill United Troop are on duty every Wednesday evening of the year. They move bed and wheel chair patients to and from the hospital auditorium to see motion picture shows. Four patrols alternate in doing the weekly good turn at the veterans' hospital.

A Boy Scout Jamboree will be conducted at Vaudreuil, 23 miles west of Montreal, next August by La Federation des Scouts Catholiques de la Province de Quebec. All ten provinces have been invited to send at least one representative Scout Troop.

To brighten the lives of sick and handicapped boys Vancouver has appointed R. V. Smyly, a retired R.C.M.P. constable, Assistant District Commissioner for Handicapped Scouting. He directs operation of a Wolf Cub Pack and Scout Troop in the Vancouver Children's Hospital, a Cub Pack at Vancouver's T.B. Presentorium and a Cub Pack and Sea Scout Troop at the Provincial School for Deaf and Blind children.

Strange But True

78, 714 or 88 per cent of the inhabitants of P. E. I. are descendants of persons who came from the British Isles. 14,799 or 16 per cent are of French origin. Population by age groups works out as follows: ten years of age and under, 19,183 or 20 per cent; from 10 to 20 years 16,974 or 20 per cent; from 20 to 40, 26,866 or 28 per cent; 40-60, 17,911 or 19 per cent; 60 and over, 12,414 or 13 per cent. These figures are based on the 1941 census. The next nose count should reveal a considerable increase in the Island's population, especially for the city of Charlottetown which counted 14,821 persons for 1941. . . . By the census of 1921, less than three million women in India could read and write. In this strange land where child marriages are still not uncommon, some girls attend school after marriage, but the wealthy families now send their daughters to mission schools to be educated. . . . When the crusaders went on their pilgrimage to the Holy Land they cut up the bodies of their dead and boiled them in order to get the bones, which could be conveniently sent back to relatives in Europe. To put an end to this custom Pope Boniface VIII decreed that anyone cutting up a body and boiling it should fall under the ban of the church.

Florence Nightingale made nursing a dignified profession. The idea of training nurses to attend the sick originated with Theodore Flieder, pastor of a small German town. Later, he established a school for nursing, and it was this school which Florence Nightingale attended prior to the Crimean War where her skill in nursing sick soldiers won her international fame. . . . All diseases of early Christians were ascribed to demons, and every community had its persons who were supposed to be able to cast out devils. As late as the 17th century King Charles 2nd of Spain had his confessor and two friars sit beside his bed while he slept to keep away the devils. Men who cast out devils were very careful to keep their mouths closed while carrying out their exorcisms, lest the devil should jump from the mouth of the patient into their own. . . . Believe it or not, but 42,029 persons, or 48 per cent of the Island's workers earned \$450 or under in the year 1941. While only 1,069 earned \$2,950 and over during the same period. Our sister province of Nova Scotia, (during the same year), paid less than \$450, per annum to 40,840 workers. On the higher bracket scale 1,944 persons earned an annual income of \$290, and over. . . .

To acquire saintliness, some Hindu fakirs add ropes of twisted goat's hair to their own locks. This fantastic headdress is sometimes referred to as snake locks because the long, slender coils resemble snakes. When the fakir moves about, he winds the coils about his shoulders and head in a sun-resisting turban. . . . Tibet, often referred to as the forbidden land, has no welcome for the stranger within its gates. Guarding the passes leading into this inhospitable land, are great fortresses, each of which contains a
