ISLAND PRODUCE.—Cape Breton is an excellent market for P. E. Island produce. About fifty cargoes of produce have been sold in Cape Breton from the Island this year. P. E. Island potatoes have been selling in North Sydney this week at 20 cents per bushel.—North Sydney Herald.

FROM MONTREAL.—The returns show that up to last week 86,694 head of cattle; 129,763 sheep and 5,579 horses have been exported from Montreal, against 83,322 cattle, 3,743 sheep, and 1,660 horses last year. The losses during the year have been 834 sheep and 90 head of cattle against 29 sheep, and 141 cattle for 1893.

THE GULBANE ASHORE.—The North Sydney Herald says: "The steamer Gulbane, owned by the Dominion Coal Company, and which was anchored near the International for some months past, broke from her moorings during Monday night's gale, and is now high and dry on the beach." The Gulbane was formerly owned in this Province.

DIED IN THE NORTHWEST.—Mr. Neil C. Macintosh, of the Northwest Mounted Police, died recently at Maple Creek, some distance from Regina. Typhoid fever was the cause of death. Mr. Macintosh was about twenty-four years of age and was a printer by trade having served his apprenticeship in the office of Mr. Geo. W. Gardner. He was well-known in Charlottetown, and his death is deeply regretted.
