District commissioner Tanton spoke on the ever present shortage of leaders, especially for scouts, and asked everyone to be on the lookout for suitable persons. He also spoke on the regatta scheduled this summer and advised that one troop has two boats under construction.

Assistant district commissioner for training, Bob Shaipr, gave a detailed report on camping, leaders training courses and first aid courses which were conducted during the year. Particular mention could be made of the training course for leaders at the RCAF station on March 29 when 48 leaders participated. Mr. Shaipr also reported that two cub packs had been started in the Hillcrest area and a troop and pack in Malpeque.

**Summerside** — Weather conditions have suspended work on the controversial liquor store site on Granville Street north. At about the same time it was rumored yesterday that the building may be used for storage and furniture rather than liquor.

Members of the civic committee of the board of trade had met to consider replies for suggestions to an alternate site. George Meikle, chairman of the committee, could not be contacted last evening for comment on the possible sites. Once an area has been chosen, recommendations will be prepared for the P.E.I. Liquor Control Commission.

Frank MacDonald, secretary of the liquor commission, has stated that the government of the province has authorized the liquor commission to proceed with a store for the Summerside area.

Town Mayor W. E. Jenkins yesterday commended the Summerside Board of Trade for the interest it has shown in the touchy matter of the new liquor store being built.

## Leaving Scene Costs Man \$100

Thomas Herbert Avery, Alberton, entered a plea of not guilty to the same assault charge and the case was also adjourned to June 2.
