

Indian Social Scientist Gives View On Red China

Editor's note—This article is based on six weeks travel through Red China by a noted Indian social scientist. Among other things, it weighs the Communist Chinese challenge from an Indian standpoint.

An intriguing, if disconcerting, aspect of the contemporary Chinese scene is the tremendous nationwide political propaganda concerning who Red China's friends and enemies are. The whole nation has been taught that there is one great socialist friend of China—the "selfless" Soviet Union—and one irreconcilable "imperialist enemy"—the United States.

The Soviet Union, whether selfless or not, is responsible for providing 90 per cent of the heavy machinery, an overwhelming majority of all technical experts and almost all the blueprints for China's industrial progress.

SPECIAL TREATMENT
It is no wonder that Russians receive preferential treatment all over China. The Chinese now are building special hotels for Russians so that they can have their own life without meeting or mingling with other foreigners from within or without the Communist world.

At every hotel in which I stayed during my six weeks in Red China, from Canton to Harbin in Manchuria, I found that my fellow guests belonged to some Soviet delegation or other. These delegations range from geological teams and steel experts down to acrobats and dancers. China is being rapidly Russified in dress and manners, language and culture.

The only foreign language recognized in China is Russian. From menus to theatre notices, from directions at stations and airports to travel information, I found only two languages—Chinese and Russian.

CULTURE INVASION
Russian literature, Russian ballet, Russian teaching and Russian thinking have invaded China.

from Mukden to Canton. On the other hand, there is the contrast of China's attitude to America. America has acquired the permanent adjective of "imperialistic" in the Chinese language.

In every town the visitor is greeted by a huge poster—some 40 by 60 feet—showing a picture of Communist China crushing America and Secretary of State Dulles.

All mass media—press, platform, radio and the inevitable loudspeaker—have been harnessed to din into the Chinese the idea that America is the greatest menace to peace and prosperity.

HATE UNITED STATES
And, I believe, they have largely succeeded in training a

nation of 50,000,000 to hate the United States. China's case against the United States is a simple one. America should withdraw the Seventh Fleet and get out of Formosa so that the Communists can occupy it.

The second complaint is that the United States is preventing China from taking her place in the United Nations.

The creation of an external enemy, is a powerful force to cement internal unity and secure support for the existing regime—a regime that is not entirely loved by all the 650,000,000 Chinese.

It is interesting that one hears little in China about the British possessions of Hong Kong, Kowloon, and the New Territories or Portuguese Macao.

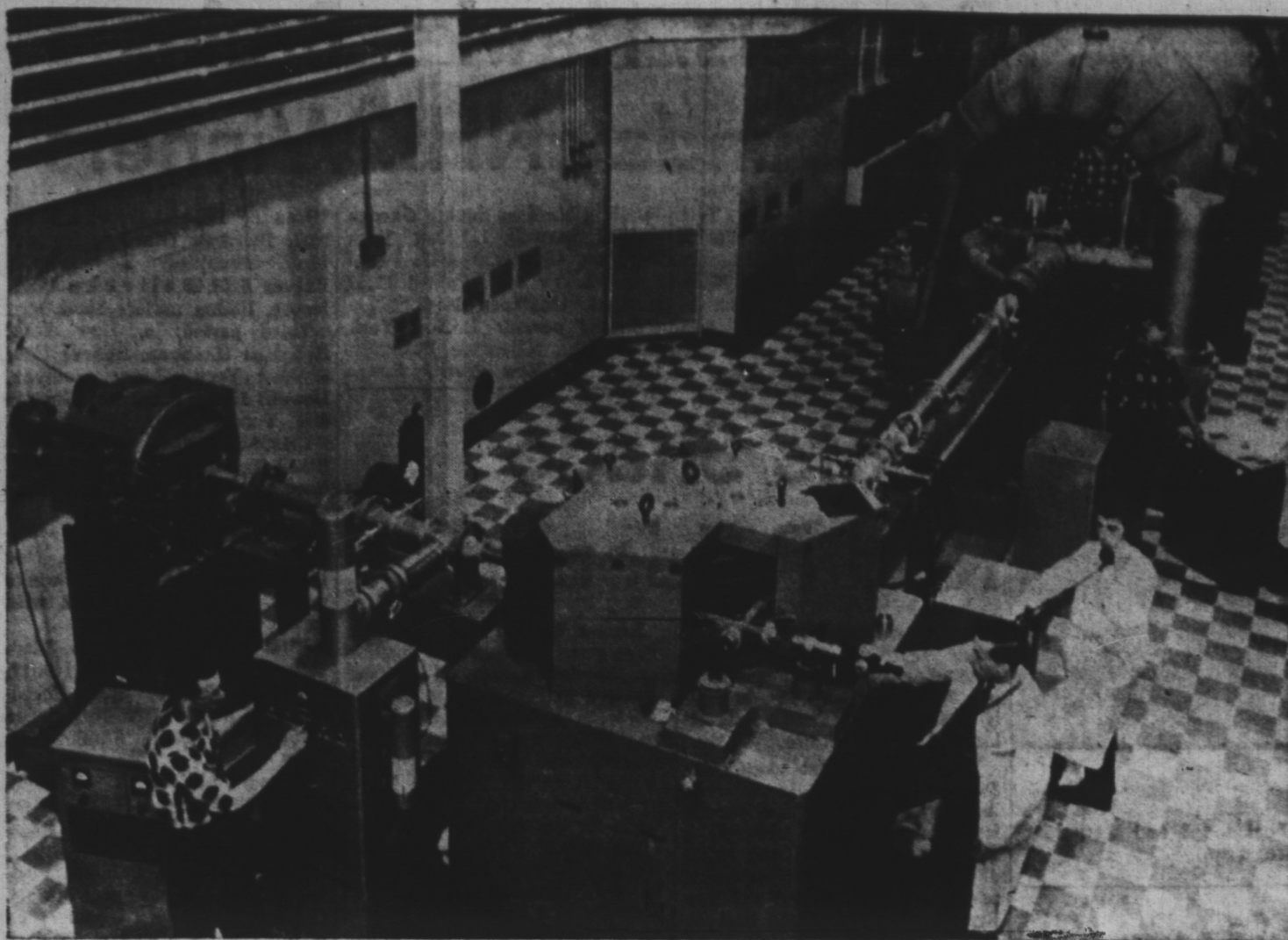

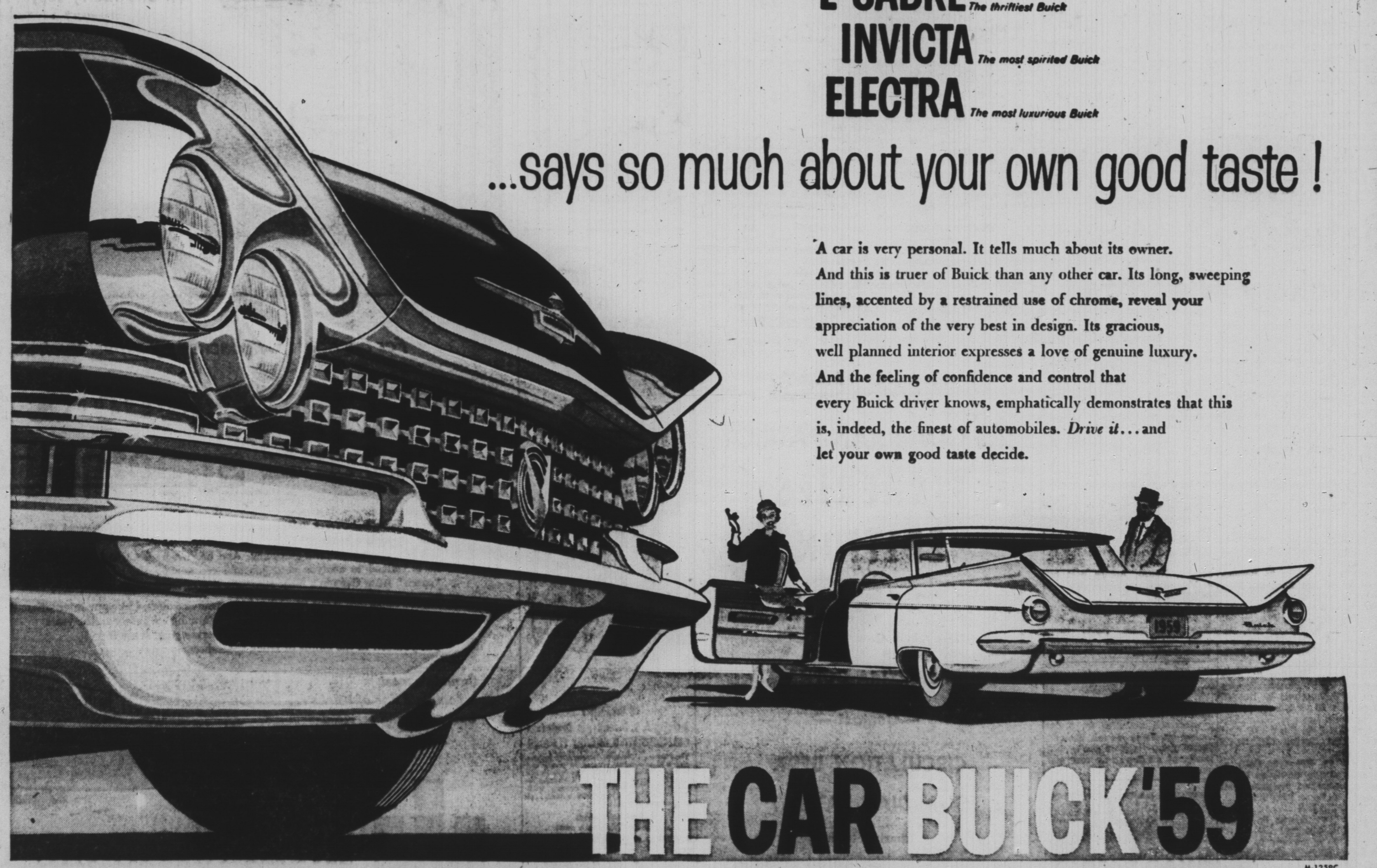
KENSINGTON
