

ATHENS, Aug. 27 —(A.P.)—Premier Nicholas Plastiras has conferred with his ministers on reducing Greece's military conscription period from its present three years to a lesser period like its fellow N.A.T.O. members. Government sources said today that it was hardly fair for Greece to keep her men under arms three years when other North Atlantic Treaty countries contented themselves with 12 months' to two years' service.


