Warns Against

high school grades. Furthermore, they need, rather than teaching tricks for drilling material into their students' heads, a knowledge of psychology, sociology, and the philosophy of history, education, to enable them to meet any situation, and at the same time to participate understandingly and usefully in the life of the community.

The speaker went on to refute the two arguments which are most commonly employed by those who oppose the raising of teacher education standards. First, that it is neither possible nor practical to raise the standards because the shortage of teachers which is already acute in many parts of the country would become even more of a problem. Dr. Phillips contended, however, that the higher standards in the teaching profession are, the more good candidates will present themselves. To lower the prestige of the profession by lowering its qualifications would be simply to drive away candidates, and he cited the fact that there is no shortage of high school teachers, for whom the profession is made more attractive by the higher standards.

Britain's Example

The second of these two arguments is that the country cannot afford to raise teacher training standards. Dr. Phillips pointed out that in Britain, where the most rigid austerity is being practiced, there has been no lowering of the standard which requires that a teacher have a minimum of two years of professional training. He also told his audience about a trial, remarking that it is certainly no more wealthy than Canada, yet in teacher training institutions in that country there are not only no fees, but those studying to enter the profession are paid £220 a year living allowance. It is a matter of educating the people to spend a little of what they would ordinarily spend on liquor, tobacco and cars to provide proper teacher training.

Dr. Phillips said that he had gathered from the speech made by the Minister of Education Tuesday morning that there was a possibility of allowing students to come to P.W.C. for one year after Grade X and receive a license which he supposed would be equivalent to the old 3rd class license, to go out and teach at the end of that year. He quoted a report written before the war by Dr. R. H. Shaw, predecessor to Dr. L. W. Shaw, in which it was stated that "you cannot expect teachers one grade ahead of their pupils to cope with them," and that "they shouldn't be licensed unless they are at least two years in advance of their pupils."

Dr. Phillips said he did not have words to express in public what he thought of the idea of allow-

teaching teachers who had themselves graduated from Grade X in a one-department school, with an additional one year of part academic and part professional teacher training to be allowed to go and teach in the same sort of school themselves. The obvious approval by his listeners of Dr. Phillips' words was evidenced by their hearty and spontaneous applause following this and his subsequent remarks upon the subject of lowering the standards.

Would Make Province Unique

He went on to say that P. E. I. would surely be unique as one province headed on the down grade

if such steps were taken, and added that he didn't think that the Minister of Education, who expressed some excellent ideas upon education in his address, had been serious in what he said about lowering the standards.

Dr. Phillips spoke for a moment about the Director of Education, Dr. L. W. Shaw, describing him as "one of the best men in education in the country," a view which he reiterated when speaking to a Guardian reporter, saying that he was sure that any educational system under the guidance of Dr. Shaw, whom he had known for many years, was bound to progress.

Yesterday morning the teachers attending the convention heard an address by the Director of Education, Dr. L. W. Shaw. The rest of the morning was spent in two periods of group instruction, a discussion on the teaching of English composition by Miss Helen Yeo, B.A., M.Ed., and a general discussion group.

Last evening the delegates were entertained at an informal social at P.W.C. Auditorium, when a play was presented by the pupils of Notre Dame Academy, followed by a sing-song, musical games and refreshments. The convention will conclude today with further periods of group instruction and an open discussion period in which all will be invited to participate.
