

## Cadets And Handicapped Share Camp Joys And Duties

BENEDEN, England (CP) — Authorities on child care are watching a British experiment in which about 100 handicapped children are enjoying outdoor camp holidays with the help of cadets and girl guides.

In this Weald of Kent community, at one of several centres operated by the British Red Cross Society, 11 children—some spasmodically crippled, some deaf or blind—are learning confidence in outdoor activities under supervision of 18 Red Cross cadets aged between 12 and 15, and six girl guides, as well as some older persons.

Cadets and children sleep in dormitories, but as much time as possible is spent outside and the handicapped ones are encouraged to take an active part in the program. A correspondent of The

## Dismisses Appeal In Libel Suit

OTTAWA (CP) — The Supreme Court of Canada Tuesday dismissed with costs an appeal by George A. Leslie against lower court decisions throwing out his \$25,000 libel suit against The Canadian Press.

Leslie, a former house officer at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, sued CP for publishing on June 12,

1952 "an untrue, inaccurate, unfair and defamatory" report of the testimony of a witness at a Supreme Court of Ontario trial.

The witness' testimony was given in a trial that resulted from a charge of slander by Leslie and his wife against the CPR and L. C. P. Parkinson, hotel personnel manager.

Leslie, who argued his own case before the Supreme Court of Canada, lost both his slander suit and his libel suit against CP in the lower courts.

## May Be Possible To Calculate Power Of Human Heart Soon

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. public health service reported Wednesday it may soon be possible to calculate the power output of the human heart.

Such information, it said, would be of great value to doctors in determining the physical abilities and limitations of heart patients. The heart power measurements would also be a valuable guide in judging the risks of stressful operations.
