Case Against Covehead Youth Is Adjourned

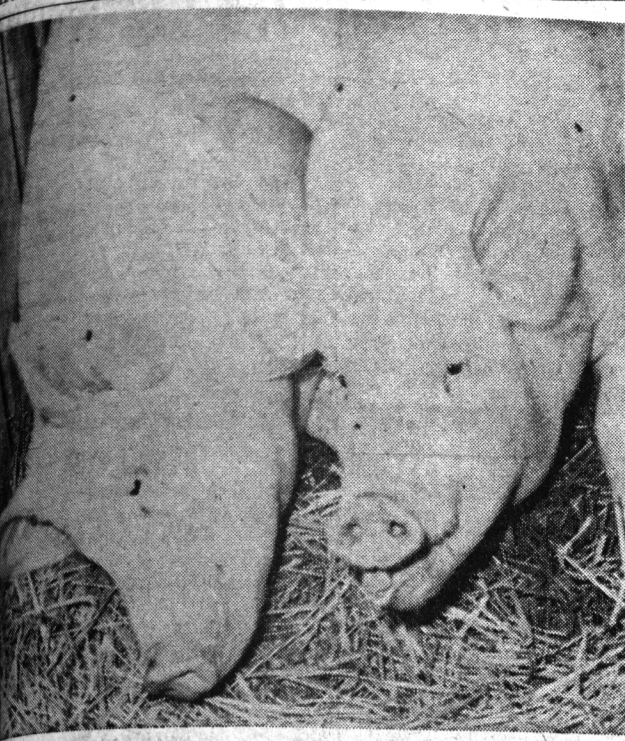
Evidence in the case against a Pleasant Grove youth charged with driving while intoxicated was heard in Queen's County Magistrate's Court Wednesday. Two witnesses were heard and the case was adjourned until September 17th. Jack Nicholson represented the Crown. Allison Gillis appeared for the accused. A Belvedere Road man was sentenced to 10 days in the Queen's County Jail on a driving while intoxicated charge. A second charge against the man was withdrawn. Speeding fines of \$10 and costs or 10 days were meted out to an East Royalty man a resident of Prince St., Charlottetown, and a Halifax, N.S. man. Fines of \$5 and costs or five days were given a Hunter River resident and a West Royalty resident for failing to stop at a stop sign and a St. Mary's Road man for operating a motor vehicle with defective equipment.

Rail Traffic Shows Increase

Rail traffic from the mainland via the Cape Tormentine-Port Borden route, showed a good increase in the month of August over the same period last year. Canadian National Railways has reported. A C.N.R. report Wednesday said 1659 carloads of goods entered the Province during the month an increase of 293 over August 1957. The number of cars leaving the Province with goods for the mainland also showed a jump. The report stated 439 carloads left P.E.I. in August, an increase of 58 over the 1957 total.

Protestant Family Group Planning Fund Drive

The Protestant Family Service Bureau will make its annual appeal for funds during the week of September 27th. This was the date reached by a largely attended meeting of the Board of Directors, held at the Dominion Building Tuesday evening with President, Alfred S. Tait as chairman. Members of the Board will constitute the Campaign Committee, with Mrs. J. A. Lawson directing the Women's Division and R. J. Dupert handling the Publicity. The objective of the campaign is \$22,000, a target which the chairman stated, "must be reached if the Board is to adequately supply the services for which it is organized."

Crime Prevention Is Theme Of Mounted Police Directive

Constant advocates of the old adage "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," Canada's Royal Canadian Mounted Police yesterday commenced the distribution of another in their yearly series of booklets entitled "Crime in Your Community." In addition members of the Force are also handing out a double-sided hand-bill which has been prepared particularly for the nation's motorists. "These two publications are simply a continuance of our efforts to reduce crime and the causes of crime," Inspector E.L. Martin, Commanding Officer of the RCMP's Island Division said yesterday.

PREVENTION PROJECT

By such directives the Force hopes to prevent those who would not normally be criminals from starting on careers of crime, he added, observing that the suggestions offered in the pamphlets are designed to eliminate anything that might make crime easy.

"It is surprising," he said, how many motorists will park their cars and leave the keys in the ignition thus tempting some irresponsible youngster to joy-ride. The youth does not mean to commit a crime, but nevertheless he has done so."

Among the many preventive methods businessmen are urged to put in force are the following: Rotating employees in "sensitive" positions; prohibiting delivery personnel from accepting cheques; keeping cash in registers down to a minimum. The eight-page pamphlet also advocates listing the serial numbers of all electrical equipment kept on business premises; screening and barring all rear windows, and keeping a light on in the vicinity of the company safe and over the back door. The pamphlet concludes with the following statement: "Do not

permit carelessness to start someone on a criminal career when prevention is so much easier than cure." When leaving cars unattended motorists are advised to remove the ignition key; lock all doors; close all windows, and lock all articles of value in the trunk.
