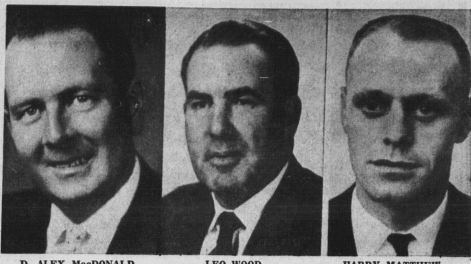

## Souris Hospital Plans Drive To Meet Deficit

**SOURIS BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
Following a weekend meeting of the board of trustees of the Souris Hospital it was announced by chairman, Milton Fitzpatrick, that at the end of 1962 the hospital was saddled with a deficit of more than \$40,000. Mr. Fitzpatrick said that the greater part of the deficit was the result of extensive renovations that were carried out during the year. "A portion of the \$40,000 may be recovered by grants from the federal and provincial governments," he said.

Even with these grants he estimated that a balance of between \$20,000 and \$25,000 would still remain, which he felt could not be taken care of out of ordinary revenue.

To cover this amount the greater portion of it, he trusted, would be carried out in a campaign for funds will be carried out within the next few weeks. The present plan is to conduct

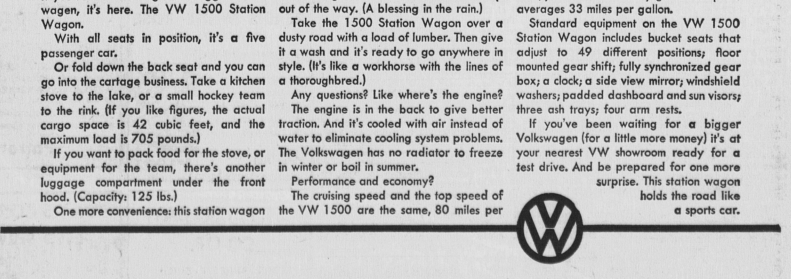
