

Hamilton In 24-7 Win Over Toronto In Football Semi-Final Yesterday

TORONTO, Nov. 7 (CP)—Cam Fraser, a 20-year-old whose name wasn't even on the program, practically stole the show today as Hamilton Tiger-Cats walloped Toronto Argonauts 24-7 in the ice, snow, water and slush of Varsity Stadium. It gave them a 17-point cushion for the second game of their home-and-home Big Four football semi-finals.

Forced deep into their own zone by Joe (King) Krol's superb first-half kicking and the weak return punting of Tom Worthington, Tiger-Cats pulled the wraps off Fraser in the final 30 minutes and the kid calmly reversed the positions. He out-kicked Joe and fired the Tigers to a well-earned triumph.

Fraser's towering 45- and 55-yard booms kept the 1950 Dominion champions deep in Argo territory. The Hamilton front wall ripped through to roam around the Toronto backfield and the backs bored holes in the double blue line and galloped for good gains around the ends.

It was a battle of kicking and the winglines and Tiger-Cats showed

ed their class by coming from behind 7-6 at half time to punch over for two converted touchdowns and a single in the final two quarters to take their big lead to Hamilton Saturday for the second game.

Sharing the spotlight was 21-year-old Hag Waggoner, 170-pound back from Tulane University who went over for two touchdowns. He ripped through the middle for a 72-yard touchdown gallop in the first quarter and sent Tiger-Cats into the lead in the third with a 22-yard snake run through a maze of tacklers.

Tip Logan, the Big Four's leading point scorer during the regular schedule, made the convert for a 12-7 lead and Hamilton didn't look back. Logan also kicked two other converts.

A small crowd of 12,200 turned out for the game, played under conditions almost similar to the 1950 Grey Cup mud bath. A two-inch snowfall Tuesday evening, followed by a heavy rain blanketed the unprotected Varsity ground with a mound of snow and slush. Students and workmen using shovels, brooms and a snowplow worked from early morning until game time in efforts to make field conditions at least playable and they did a good job considering the messy morass.

Toronto Leafs In Second Place Tie With Boston

TORONTO, Nov. 7 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs climbed into second place with Boston Bruins in the National Hockey League tonight with an uninspiring 1-0 victory over the fifth place Chicago Black Hawks. A crowd of 12,434 sat on their hands most of the 60 minutes dull play.

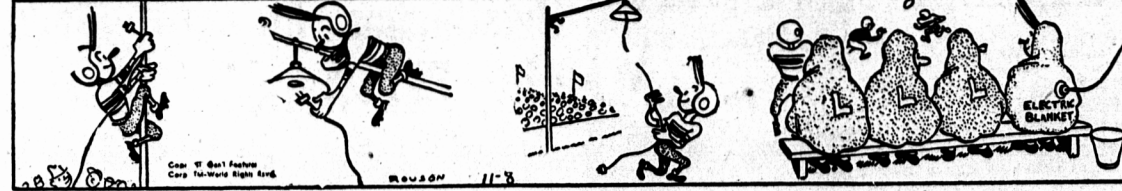

Islanders Squeeze Out 5-4 Victory Over Millionaires

Leo Lamoureux's Charlottetown Islanders squeezed out a narrow 5-4 verdict over Sydney Millionaires here at the Forum last night to move into a third place tie with idle Moncton Hawks just one point behind second spot, Glace Bay Miners.

It was Islanders seventh game without a loss with six victories and a tie.

Sydney Islanders' centre Willie Marshall pulled the deadlock game out of the fire at the 7:19 mark of the final frame on a beautiful breakaway play with Don Bellringer. The goal made the hat-trick for the fleet footed Marshall on the night's play.

Wide open and fast throughout every stage of the three periods it was a rollicking free-scoring game that saw both teams deadlocked at 1-1 at the end of the first and 4-4 at the end of the second and gave a near-capacity crowd some terrific hockey.

Islanders Open Scoring

Islanders opened the scoring at 17:25 of the first frame when Marshall banged a hard slap-shot past Nick Pidsodny from about half way in from the blueline on a neat play with Bellringer and Gray while both teams were playing a man shy. Dunc "Big Train" MacIntyre deadlocked the count at 18:34 with MacBride and Prokop while holding a one-man advantage. That was all the scoring for the frame but it was not without its sparkle and rugged action. With both teams breaking out with some driving plays that kept both goaltenders hot and busy, some rugged play brought about nine penalties before the frame ended. Levandoski got the gate for holding at the seven second mark. Vitale for tripping at 12:07, Gray for holding the puck at 12:12 to start the ball rolling. Things really got hot at the 12:32 mark. Ganging in around Islanders' cage Dutchak and Roach tangled in a punching duel that brought majors for both and then MacIntyre and Roach got into the same fray that cost both of them a minor and misconduct award apiece. Marneau went to sinners row for holding at 19:55.

Taking advantage of Marneau's carry over penalty into the second frame, Marshall struck home for his second goal at the 30 second mark when he fired a driving shot from the point blank range to send Islanders to the front again. Sydney retaliated strongly in the next eight minutes of play to bang home two goals and take the lead for the first time in the game. Prokop scooped up MacIntyre's pass rearing down the right boards to fire a long, high shot past Gordon from just inside the blueline at 4:33 with Prokop teaming up at 8:31 with Brinkov and Roach in a gang attack around the Islanders cage to fire home the tally that gave them the edge.

Their lead was short lived, however. Centreman Buck Whitlock deadlocked the count at 3:3 at 9:43 on a snappy play started by defenceman Phil Vitale. Carrying in over the blueline, Vitale let Whitlock up with the goal with a drop-pass that Buck made no mistake on from about 15 feet out.

MacIntyre put Millionaires in front again on a slick play with Don "Red" MacRae at 15:33 on a

power play inside the blueline. MacRae sent in a nice pass from the right boards half way in that went right past the net to MacIntyre who just had to flip it in behind Gordon who never had a chance on the play. Bellringer knotted the count while Sydney was a man short. Cupolo off for tripping. It was a smooth three-way attack with Bonhomme and Gray at 18:44.

The Winning Goal
 Although both clubs battled bitterly in the third and both came up with close scoring chances, it was a dashing play between Marshall and Bellringer that came up with the only goal of the frame and a winning one.

Breaking out over his own blueline during a Sydney pressure attack, Bellringer carried right in over the opposing blueline with only one man back. Going right in to draw the lone defenceman on one side, Bellringer made a beautiful pass back to a trailing Marshall who let go a beautiful wing shot that had Pidsodny beating the net. Despite some driving hockey and plenty of scoring chances the game ended that way with the Islanders holding a one-goal bulge.

Bellringer Injured
 Islanders' clever wingman and playmaker, Don Bellringer had to be taken to the dressing room on a stretcher in the final stages of the third frame. With only 12 seconds left to play, Bellringer received a nasty gash from a skate during a pileup around the Islanders cage. It took five stitches to pull the wound together. It was on the right leg below the knee, and although club doctors said X-rays would be taken in the event of a bone injury, they felt sure that the injury was not serious.

St. Mary's Snap Losing Streak, Down Miners 4-2

HALIFAX, Nov. 7 (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's snapped a seven-game losing streak that had produced only a tie by defeating Glace Bay Miners 4-2 here tonight.

The Saints did it handily, out-playing and outshooting Miners most of the way and giving the highly-rated Glace Bay outfit little chance to threaten.

Checking the young, fast moving Miners closely, the locals took advantage of the breaks, back checked furiously and for the most part, played a strong game in all departments.

The locals took the lead in the first period, lost it through a bit of loose defence work, then regained it before the session ended. Throughout a scoreless end-of-period, they held a good margin over the Miners but Glace Bay goalie Hicks was hot and kept them off the rushes. In the third, opportunity knocked twice for the Saints and they converted both times. Late in the period, Miners scored their final goal.

Two new players were dressed by the Saints. Joe McArthur and Bill Ford. The latter is familiar to Halifax fans. He played two seasons with the Saints. Though both players skated well, it was

obvious that they were not yet fitted into the Halifax plan. McArthur appears to be an aggressive type.

One of the outstanding players on the Halifax lineup was Gordie Pearson. The tow-headed, front liner played a strong two-way game and scored the second Halifax goal with a smart piece of head work.
