## DR. BONNELL SPEAKS

### Tourist Planning Urged Before Causeway Opens

More active planning for the development of the tourist industry was advocated in the Legislature yesterday morning by Dr. M.L. Bonnell (L—4th Kings).

"I think," he said, "the minister of tourist development should start to move. More tourist roads, expanded motels and better advertising are needed.

"If we don't get ready for 1970 when the causeway opens, we will be left holding the bag.

"There is great prospect for development in the tourist field and if the minister has no ideas he should hire an expert to advise him."

Dr. Bonnell also suggested that the minister of agriculture hire an expert to give advice because of "lack of policy in the department of agriculture."

It was suggested by Dr. Bonnell that if the premier hired enough experts, some of the cabinet ministers could be done away with.

**MEDICARE**  
In the debate on the draft address, Dr. Bonnell said he noted the provincial government is proposing a "limited medical care" plan for certain residents.

"The federal government," he said, "has made an offer to pay half the cost of a universal medicare plan. If we don't accept that offer, we still have to pay our taxes and share of the cost of medicare plans for people of other provinces and still all residents here are not covered."

"We will be paying for our own medical care, a partial plan for some residents of the province and a plan for the rest of Canada."

"If we are going to have a plan, let's take full advantage of the federal participation so we will all benefit — then we only pay our own share."

Dr. Bonnell said he hoped "that when the program comes in, it won't be a program dictated by government and that it will be independent of government."

Commenting on the annual death toll from accidents in the province, Dr. Bonnell suggested that the government should have a safety officer in one of the departments of government.

He said "I don't believe this

government is doing one constructive thing about safety." He suggested more guidance from government is needed in the prevention of highway, home and industrial accidents.

Dr. Bonnell suggested that the government should provide "clover-leafs" at all Trans-Canada Highways sections in the province. He also felt that secondary roads should be improved before an all-weather road construction is carried out.

It was maintained by Dr. Bonnell that the province's highway system will be inadequate five years after the causeway is built unless better planning of highway construction is started immediately. He suggested that railway crossings in the province should have over-passes or under-passes.

**MINIMUM WAGE**  
Speaking of the proposed raising of the minimum wage from a dollar to \$1.10, Dr. Bonnell said, "the 10-cent an hour increase is a pittance, just a gimmick because it might be an election year."

"The government must increase the wages of the working men and women of the province," said the Kings member. He called on the government to see the processing plants were paying decent wages.

"I want the new minister of labor to do a lot more than the former minister, you sir," said Dr. Bonnell looking across to Dr. Hubert MacNeill. "couldn't live on 60 cents an hour."

Dr. Bonnell blamed the minister of labor for telling the people the reason the government was able to give increased
