CITY SCHOOLS.

Annual Midsummer Examinations.

WEST KENT STREET SCHOOL.

The neat flower garden in front of West Kent Street School at once gives the visitor a favorable impression, which, heightened by the clear, bright rooms and walls, without a mark or scratch. It is evident at once that the teachers are persons of good taste and care, and that aesthetics are not, as in too many schools, entirely forgotten in the education of the youth in attendance.

The visitors included His Honor, the Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. McDonald, Rev. J. M. McLeod and Miss McLeod, J. D. Mason, Esq., and Miss Mason, W. E. Dawson, Thomas Handrahan, Donald Farquharson, Archibald Kennedy, A. B. McDonald, John Ings, now or lately of the Board of School Trustees, Hon. David Laird, Professor Anderson and Mr. McLeod, of Prince of Wales College, Mr. McSwain, Principal of the Model School, Mr. Oxenham, Secretary of the School Board, Dr. Taylor, Councillor McLeary, and many others.

There was a good attendance of pupils, though too many of the forms in the higher classes were vacant, and the examination conducted by Professor Anderson, Mr. McLeod, Mr. McSwain, Miss Fennessy and other visitors, as well as by the teachers, was, on the whole, highly satisfactory. The entertainment at the close was very pleasing, the singing, reading, etc., being good without exception. His Honor the

Lieut. Governor distributed the prizes, and delivered a short address, in which he spoke of the good order which prevailed throughout the school, and the readiness and accuracy of the pupils in answering questions put to them by the visiting examiners. W. E. Dawson, Esq., (who presided) dismissed the school, and announced that it would be re-opened on Monday, 31st August next. Professor Anderson testified to the ability of the boys in Mr. Miller's Class, his only complaint being that "they don't speak up, well."
