## Birth Rate Declines In Province

OTTAWA — Number of births in Prince Edward Island continues to decline, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported Thursday.

For November, there were 180 births registered in the province compared to 210 a year ago. This brings the total for the first 11 months of the year to 2,296 compared to 2,509 for the corresponding period in 1964.

The decline in terms of percentage is 8.5 which is even higher than the 6.9 percentage drop in births in Canada as a whole.

However, the number of marriages in P.E.I. has risen to 638 compared to 603 for the first 11 months of the year and deaths increased from 884 to 914 to the end of November.

Natural population increase of the island province is 1,382.

## York Farmers Make Outstanding Purchase

The 4-year old heifer pictured here is perhaps the glamour girl of the six outstanding Holstein cows and heifers purchased recently for the Lewisdale herd of Lewis Brothers, York.

The 4-year old heifer with the long name — it's O.H.W. Citadel Model, is milking 70 pounds per day with an average test of 4.4 percent. Her lactation began November 1. She was "Good Plus" when we bought her, she is "Very Good now", Mr. Lewis explained.

"We have great expectations for this cow. She has cleanliness of udder, a good udder, refinement and dairy character, the type of things we've been looking for to add to our herd," Ira Lewis told The Guardian.

"Our herd is big and strong, but here and there it is lacking in refinement," he explained.

This heifer is sired by Rosale Citation R, one of the top sires of his time. There's a story connected with this bull that ties in with the Island, The Guardian's Farm Column on Tuesday of this week will carry this interesting and colorful story.

The Farm Column also carried a brief reference to the Lewisdale herdman, Bernhard Schmalz, who is holding the Holstein heifer in the picture.

The York farmers paid \$800 for the daughter of Citation; not the top price, but her breeding has just a bit more interest than any of the rest.

## HIGH ON HEIFER

The brothers are high on a two-year old heifer, Pevvale Sylvia Mistress, a daughter of Raymondale Sovereign Master. She has given 15,000 pounds of milk in 295 days, and will have about 17,000 pounds in her 2-year-old lactation. She has really outstanding prospects as a producer, Mr. Lewis commented. She's graded Good Plus, with prospects of being Very Good at the next grading, it was observed.

Incidentally "Very Good" is the next to the highest classification — it's for Conformation that is available. The top classification is "Excellent" and the only Holstein cow on the Island with that rating now is in the Lewisdale barn.

They purchased Sylvia for

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on both sides of her pedigree. A young heifer — she won't be three until February — she has already produced more than 11,000 pounds in the present lactation which started last February. She was purchased for \$500.

Rock Elm Royal Reta, another Very Good cow, has the production record with a breed class average of 140 percent. She is sired by Rosale Signet on one side. On the other side, of her pedigree is a grandsire, Maple Leaf Reflection Sovereign.

This means that on both sides of her pedigree Reta has sires that have produced winning "gets" at the Royal Winter Fair, the International in the United States, and they have sired All Canadian and All American gets. Reta was purchased for \$750.

The Lewisdale herd was also increased with the addition of a promising looking young Holstein female calf.
