Agricultural News

(Continued from Page 3) and tall enough (10-12 inches high) to provide an umbrella effect over the smaller legume seedlings. The farmers who follow these precautions have been spraying their grain fields under sown with legumes successfully for several years now. Each year more and more farmers are spraying their corn fields with chemical weed killers; mainly to eradicate the weeds in the row that are difficult if not impossible to remove by cultivation. Under normal weather conditions, corn at a height of 3 to 10 inches is rather resistant to injury by 2, 4-D. If, however, dry warm weather follows the treatment, leaf roll and brace root injury may moderate to severe, but not likely to cause as much reduction in yield as a heavy infestation of weeds in the corn row. Also, when a heavy rainfall comes right after spraying the same injuries appear. Under such conditions the corn is very susceptible to wind injury or to contact when cultivation. Cultivation should therefore, be delayed for at least 10 to 14 days following the spraying. I should add that the injury to corn from the causes I have mentioned increases with the height of the corn. The shorter the corn when it is sprayed, the less likelihood of injury. If the corn is 12 to 24 inches tall and there are many weeds in the rows, we consider this an emergency situation and may be handled by using drop pipes on the boom of the sprayer with the nozzles adjusted so that most of the spray material is directed on the weeds and not on the corn leaves.
