The officers and men now on the Pythias will go to England on the troopship arriving at Bermuda about the last of October with the ship's new crew. The Tourmaline will be left for Bermuda to-day. She will not return again this season.

AN IMPOSING DISPLAY.—A Toronto despatch says:—Probably one of the largest funerals ever seen in Toronto was that of the late Wm. Gooderman this afternoon. The body was taken from the residence to the Sherbourn street church at 1.30, where it lay in state and was visited by many hundreds of citizens. The cortege was an imposing sight, nearly 2,000 Salvation Army soldiers joining at the Temple. Citizens of every denomination were there and the line of carriages extended for over a mile. The gifts of flowers were very numerous. Among them was a tribute from St. Andrew's Masonic Lodge, of which he was a member for forty years.

KING'S COUNTY EXHIBITION, 1889.—We understand that the assessors of Georgetown have appointed six special constables to maintain order on exhibition day in that town, who will take charge of any persons acting in a disorderly manner. The assessors have not licensed "drinking booths from which alcoholic drinks will be dealt out in large quantities," the "Patriot's" information to the contrary notwithstanding. OTTAWA, Sept. 19. Mr. Colter has appealed to the Supreme Court from the decision of Judge Falconbridge setting aside the Haldimand election. Sir John Macdonald has promised to grant the use of the Senate Chamber for a reception to the American Association of Mining Engineers during their visit here. Cardinal Taschereau and Hon. Mr. Mercier have accepted invitations to attend the Catholic Congress to be held at Baltimore on November 11th.

Moncton Exhibition.

MONCTON, Sept. 19. The exhibition to-day was attended by the largest crowd of the week. A great many visitors are in town, the excursions trains being packed. The Polynorphan parade and trades procession was a grand success, as was also the torchlight procession this evening. The Amherst firemen and cornet band arrived at noon, and took part in both parades. The exhibition will be closed Friday afternoon by Hon. A. G. Blair.

Harbor Improvements.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 19. The common council had a lengthy discussion this afternoon, the greater part of the time being taken up with resolutions and discussion on harbor improvements. It was decided to forthwith purchase a dredge with necessary fittings, also to fill in the slips at the Petingiff property and thus give an extended wharf frontage. Steps were also taken towards providing large additional warehouse accommodation.

Lacrosse.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 19. A severe rain to-day prevented the lacrosse match with Pictou. The latter got to Moncton in the morning to play a picked St. John team. It is clear and bright to-night, and there is every prospect of the St. John and Shamrock's playing their first game to-morrow afternoon.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19. Abel Parent, at one time cashier of the Hochelaga Bank here, who appropriated \$30,000 belonging to the bank, for which he was sentenced to five years in penitentiary, has been released through the efforts of friends after two years imprisonment.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 19. Reports from all sections of the country are to the effect that the rains of the past two days have completely checked the forest fires in York and Sunbury Counties, and all danger is now over.

Hon. Alexander James Dead.

HALIFAX, Sept. 20. Hon. Alexander James, Judge in Equity, died at his residence, in Dartmouth, yesterday, after a protracted illness. He was 72 years of age.

A Will Broken.

DANIEL O'CONNELL, SOLE HEIR OF THE LATE SARAH O'CONNELL, PAYS TO THE WIVES OF THOMAS SNELLING AND EDWARD BLACKBURN \$1,500.

A case which has created considerable interest among persons in Herring Cove has just been settled. Mail readers will remember action having been taken in the probate court to break the will of the late Sarah O'Connell, by which she left \$3,000 to Daniel O'Connell. The contestants, Ellen Blackburn, of Charlottetown and Margaret Snelling maintained that the second will made by the late Sarah O'Connell, leaving all her property to Daniel O'Connell, had been secured through undue influence, inasmuch as the woman was in a weak state of mind and that O'Connell had influenced her to make it. The matter was brought before the court the other day and witnesses were examined in support of the will, after which the court adjourned. Shortly after the witness for the "up setting" of the will were called, Stipendiary Hayes, of Herring Cove, and Saul Smith. Upon hearing the above names called, for some reason or other, O'Connell stopped the proceedings in the court, with a view, it is said, of having the matter settled. This morning the contestants were paid \$1,500, half of the money left in the will. Mrs. Snelling and Mrs. Blackburn were formerly the Misses O'Connell, relatives of Daniel O'Connell. The first will left all deceased's property, share and share alike to the children.—Hc. Mail.
