Town's Purchase Of Bldg. Blocked

ALBERTON—A decision regarding the purchase by the town of the old post office building was left over for another meeting following discussion last night at the regular council meeting.

Gov't Studies RDA Pact

A copy of the federal-provincial agricultural rehabilitation and development agreement which has been received by the provincial government for study, acting-premier Andrew MacEwan said yesterday.

The agreement will be examined by the premier, the minister of agriculture, the attorney-general and the division of research.

Mr. MacEwan said he expects to go to Ottawa to sign the agreement officially in the near future.

Under the agreement, this province will get up to \$1,350,000 in federal funds over the next three years to assist in such projects as water conservation, rural electrification, community and recreational development.

This amount will be matched by a similar contribution from the SIAW government.

The conclusion of Macmillan's statement was greeted with an unexpected round of hand-clapping and table-thumping applause. Some delegates described Macmillan's speech as "impressive and skillful."

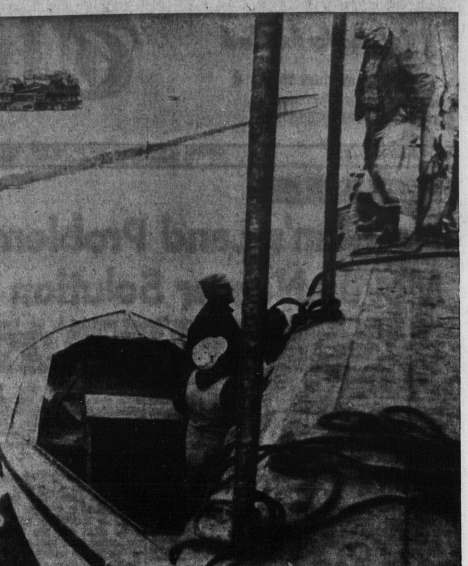
West Pt. Ferry Plan To Be Discussed Soon

He said Britain no longer can isolate itself from political developments on the continent, as

it had done before the last two world wars. If Britain had played a larger role in Europe before those wars, they might have been avoided.

Britain also was anxious to consolidate the process of reconciliation and unity that was developing between France and West Germany, Macmillan said Britain - and through it the Commonwealth countries - influence the development of this new Europe.

Macmillan repeated the idea of the Commonwealth's creating a common market of its own. He said this would be impractical because of great differences in labor costs among the Commonwealth nations.

The conclusion of Macmillan's statement was greeted with an unexpected round of hand-clapping and table-thumping applause. Some delegates described Macmillan's speech as "impressive and skillful."

"In spite of all efforts by the British Tory leader to show that it is possible to be a member of the Common Market while retaining the Commonwealth, it is clear to any clearly thinking person that the two things are incompatible."

At the opening of the Commonwealth countries approved membership when it becomes independent Oct. 9. They also gave a green light to Tanganyika to remain within the club when it becomes a republic in December.
