New Airport Is Scheduled For Sydney

OTTAWA (CP)—Construction of a new airport for Sydney, N.S., is expected to get under way early next summer and is scheduled to be completed in the summer of 1966, the transport department said today. The two-story building will cost about \$1,000,000. It will house a 700-passenger terminal, a restaurant, baggage and concession areas and a vehicle check where statistics can view activities on the runways. Offices are to be provided on the second floor for the transport department's information services, the airport manager and staff, and for the Air Canada manager. Air Canada, Eastern Provincial Airways and Air Canada are to have individual quarters in the air conditioned building. Tenders on the building are to be called in spring.
