Fellowships For Artists

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canada Council Sunday announced senior fellowships, worth up to \$4,000 each, for prominent artists representing both the creative and the performing arts in Canada.

The fellowships, which also provide for travel expenses, are tenable in Canada or abroad. The way the scholarships will be used vary from a nine-month stay in Spain painting to a 12-month study tour of major performing arts centres in Europe and North America.

The winners included Ernst C. Lorenzen a potter from Hants County, N.S.

Expert's Ambitious Efforts To Safeguard French Art

PARIS (AP)—In seven years of hard work in the service of French culture, Andre Malraux has battled critics who have attacked everything from his Paris monument-washing campaign to restroom-facilities in the Louvre.

"It hasn't been easy," said an aide commenting on the ambitious efforts Malraux has exerted to safeguard the artistic riches of France.

"When he first got the idea to give the monuments and famous buildings of Paris a scrub-up, he had to fight for one year against strong opposition from many quarters. A lot of it came from idiots who claimed the cleaning would harm the patina that age had bestowed on the buildings."

"He has even had a formal letter from an American lady who complained about the paper available in the restrooms of the Louvre."

As France's first minister of cultural affairs, Malraux has gained much attention abroad through his cleanup campaign which has restored the exterior brilliance of some of the finest architecture in Paris.
