A NUMBER of foughs at Spring Hill mines, N. S., serenading a newly wedded pair, over-loaded a small cannon which burst, breaking the windows of an adjacent house, knocking a hole through the roof of the new Presbyterian church, and otherwise injuring it.

D. Stewart for company practice on Monday, the 4th Oct.) the sixth annual competition for the Graham Cup would be held to-day, Saturday, the 2nd, on Kensington Range at 1.30 p. m.

WE learn that Chief Justice Palmer will sit in the Vice-Admiralty Court, on Monday next, at noon, for the purpose of hearing an application to sell the cargo of the seized schooner Highland Light. The cargo, for the most part, consists of mackerel, and it has been represented by the marshal of the Court that they are likely to decrease in value, and for this reason, as well as owing to the expense of keeping the mackerel in good condition, the Court will be asked to order the sale.

America Victorious.

MARBLEHEAD, MASS., Oct. 1. The English cutter Stranger and the American sloop Thetis, sailed the first of their match races this afternoon. The American boat kept the lead all through winning by a minute and a half.

NEWPORT, R. I., Oct. 1. In the match race here to-day, between the American schooner yacht Sachem, and the English schooner Miranda, the Sachem was an easy winner.

More Cricket Matches.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 1. The second cricket match between the picked men of Philadelphia and the English visitors was begun to-day. The local eleven went to the bat and their best batsmen were easily retired with 128 runs. When the stumps were drawn with seven wickets to go down the Englishmen were within 31 runs of their opponents score. The game will be resumed to-morrow morning.

LONDON, Oct. 1. Rev. Wm. Hepworth Thompson, D. D., A. S. A. is dead, aged 76.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 1. Mr. Wm. Jack, Advocate General, died at his residence, Portland, last evening. Mr. Jack was born at St. Andrews in 1811.

Further Respected.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1. The Secretary of State is officially informed that the Canadian authorities having learned that further representation on behalf of Sproule, the American convicted of murder in British Columbia, were on their way from the Department of State to London, have again respected him until Oct. 29th. He was to have been executed to-day.

More Trouble Brewing.

CHICAGO, Oct. 1. Trouble is again brewing between the men employed in the stock yards and their employers. The latter insist upon the ten-hour system, and the former demand that eight hours shall constitute a day's work. The employers are firm, and it now looks as if 20,000 men would be thrown out of employment.
