CONTINUE TO TEST PLANE NAIROBI, Kenya, April 25 — (Reuters) — Britain's record-making De Havilland Comet jet airliner today hopped the 2,200 miles from Cairo to Nairobi in five hours and nine minutes. The plane reached Cairo yesterday in a record London-Cairo flight at 430 miles an hour, breaking the previous British-held record by nearly 1 1/2 hours. The time for yesterday's 2,210-mile trip was five hours, eight minutes, 46.67 seconds. After tests in Nairobi, and then Khartoum, Sudan, the Comet is destined for the Britain-Australia service.

RUSSIAN PRINCE DIES SOUTHSEA Hampshire, England, April 25 — (Reuters) — Prince Maximilian Melikoff, former wealthy Russian aristocrat who roamed the world working as a cavalry instructor, ballet dancer, professional gambler and stable-boy, has died here, it was announced today. He was 54. Born in a stately palace at Tablakhembl, near Tiflis, Prince Melikoff had all that wealth could offer — until the Russian revolution left him penniless and he fled the country.

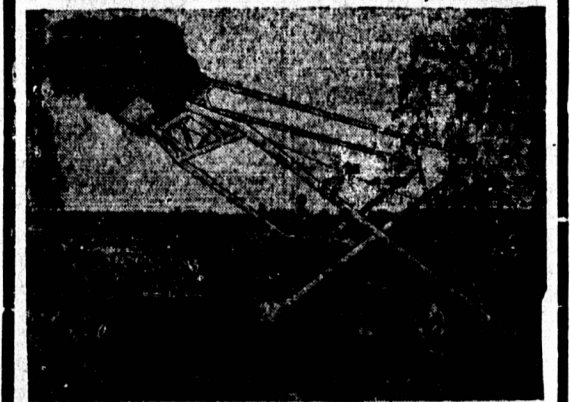

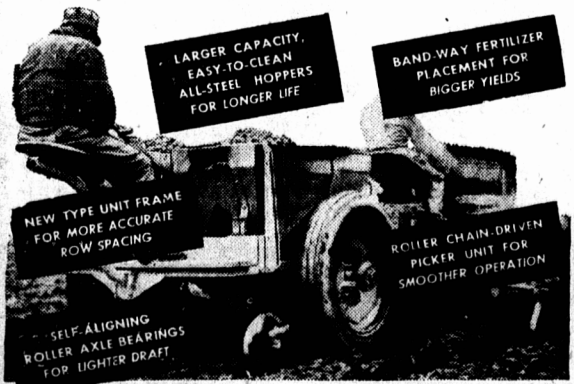
