Voters' Lists.

THE revision of the voters' lists is now in progress. It behoves all electors carefully to examine the new lists as soon as they are made public by the Revising Officers. Lists of names to be added to the last revised list, and names to be removed therefrom, are now being sent throughout the country. To each postmaster is sent a copy of the last revised lists, and one of each of the new lists of additions and removals for the polling district in which his office is situated, together with a notice of the time and place appointed for revising the same, and to the secretary of each school district two such lists and notices are sent by the Revising Officer. Under the Electoral Franchise Act it is the duty of postmasters to post the lists and notices sent them in some conspicuous place in their post offices, and secretaries of school districts are required under the law to post up the lists and notices they receive in some conspicuous place within the limits of their respective school districts. It is hoped that the duty cast upon these officials will be complied with in every instance, so that the fullest publicity may be afforded, and that all electors may have the means of protecting their electoral rights.

In this county the lists have been sent to all postmasters and secretaries of school districts in Long River, French River, Clifton, Granville, Hope River, and Judge Alley will hold a court in the courthouse at New London on Wednesday, 21st October next, to revise these lists. Lists have also been sent to Springton, Brudenbane and Westmoreland polling districts, which will be revised at a court to be held at Brudenbane Hall on Thursday, 22nd October next. The lists for New Glasgow, North Rustico, South Rustico, Hunter River and Wheatley River polling districts, which have been sent to all postmasters and school secretaries in those districts, will be revised at a court to be held at New Glasgow courthouse on Friday, 23rd October next.

The other courts will be announced as soon as the lists for them are issued. Application to add names at these courts of final revision must be made to the revising officer at least two weeks before the sitting of the court, and in cases of objection to names on the lists, two weeks' notice, by registered letter, must also be given to the party whose vote is impugned.

Notes and Comments.

The members of a scientific exploring party just returned to Philadelphia from Greenland, are of opinion that unless relief is sent to Lieut. Peary, his party cannot survive the winter. The officer is blamed for not having made adequate provision for his undertaking, and for carelessness in laying his plans.

The Empire: Weakness is perhaps the most fatal defect in the character of a man who aspires to being a statesman. No one exemplifies this truth more clearly than Mr. Laurier. The Dominion instrument of Sir Richard Cartwright, the tool of Rielite fanaticism, he presents to the people of Canada a regrettable illustration of a man who has fallen under the stress of evil company and the force of stronger minds than his own.

The Germans are still carrying on a war with the tribes of the Lakes region of Central Africa. It is clear from the results of the last battle fought, in which the Germans sacrificed ten Europeans, besides many native allies, that the natives who formerly held white men in awe as spirits are rapidly losing all fear of them and are learning to fight them effectively.

All the world, figuratively speaking, will be at the World's Fair to be held at Chicago in 1893. France, Spain, Great Britain, Mexico, Colombia, Germany, Peru, China, Venezuela, San Domingo, Chili, Turkey, Persia, Russia, Japan, Jamaica, Hayti, Siam, Ecuador, Uruguay, the Argentine Republic, Brazil, Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua and Costa Rica will officially participate. The McKinley Bill seems not to have been taken very seriously by the foreign nations.

The attention of the Opposition critics who assert that the N. P. discriminates against Great Britain, is directed by the Empire to the fact that during the first eight months of 1891 Canada has taken \$3,440,000 worth of British goods, an increase of 14 per cent. over the same period last year. The Leeds manufacturers report that since the McKinley bill passed they have found partial recompense for loss of the United States' market by the increase of Canadian custom. In the matter of export Canada has sent \$5,000,000 worth of her products to the Motherland this far in 1891, an increase of 1 per cent. over last year. The attention of Opposition detractors of the British market is directed to this fact. Unrestricted Reciprocity is very dead these days.

The Markets.

It is conceded that prices will this year be almost wholly governed by the market of Great Britain and Europe. The United States and Canada have enough and to spare, though there are, of course, particular localities in which there will be some demand for grain and other farm produce. In Charlottetown to-day white and black oats sell at from 39 cents to 32 cents per bushel, and potatoes at from 18 to 20 cents for choice, well-culled early varieties. These are wanted for points in the Maritime Provinces and the West Indies. In Toronto, oats are quoted (by the latest papers) at 34 1/2 to 35 cents per bushel—on track. In New York the price of oats is 34 to 34 1/2 cents. From the Old Country we have yet no sign, and it is quite impossible to state what prices will probably be. Judging by reports as to the British and European harvests, the demand for grains of all kinds must be good. But the supply of corn from the United States will be large, and may, for a time at least, tend to lower the price of oats. A great deal, too, will depend upon the quality of the shipments we send to the British markets. They should all be A1.

Our Fisheries.

SIR,—“Subscriber,” Grand River, Lot 14, P. E. Island, in THE EXAMINER of the 8th September, gives what he is pleased to call “the right side of the question” in replying to “X.” For the information of Mr. “X” he writes, “I wish to inform him that these gentlemen are no longer Wardens. They are Guardians.” Thanks. The lengthening of their title by two letters no doubt suggests to “Subscriber’s” mind that their salary should be correspondingly increased. To further “enlighten Mr. ‘X,’” he goes on to mention a few of our fishing rivers. They are Cascumpey Bay, Kildare River, the Narrows, French River, South West River, Indian River, Ellis River, Mill River, Grand River and Richmond Bay.” Again, thanks for this gratuitous lesson in geography. I was not aware that either Cascumpey Bay, “The Narrows” or Richmond Bay were rivers, but as “Subscriber” advises me to study up the geography of P. E. Island, he is, no doubt, an authority, and I will have to try and divest my mind of the old idea of what a river really is.

Further on “Subscriber” grows emphatic and says “there are fish guardians who have voted Liberal for many years.” Well! Well! I judged from his opening paragraph that “guardians” were a new creation. However, he certainly knows all about them, and while I may not relish the fact that some of them have voted Liberal, I will nevertheless add it to my rapidly increasing fund of information. But when “Subscriber” imagines that “X” is one of those who would have wished to secure the office and been rejected,” he convinces me, that although he may be a walking encyclopaedia, he does not possess the gift of “second sight.”

The real question is, whether the fisheries in the great majority of our streams are of sufficient value to warrant the closing of many of our mills, for that is what the strict enforcement of the law in regard to sawdust really means.

The oyster fishery is undoubtedly valuable, and should be protected, but I still hold that, with the exception of a very few rivers, the enforcing of the law will be a greater injury to the mill owners and the public generally than any benefits that will accrue therefrom. Sept. 15, 1891. X.
