Very Latest Telegrams.

London, Oct. 25.
Consols closed on Saturday at 94.
Great Britain, France and Italy have recognized the revolutionary government of Spain.
Despatches received to-night from Madrid reports that bands in Alicante have proclaimed the Federal Republic.
Despatches states that the authorities of Sydney, Australia, have positive proofs that the shooting of Prince Alfred was the result of a deeply laid plot.
The details will be given to the public in a few days.
Paris, Oct. 24.
The Avenir National, the Democratic National organ of this city, Ferdinand has declined the offer of the Crown of Spain.
The writer is certain that the Duke of Montpensier would accept it.
New York, Oct. 26.
Earthquakes continue in California, but of less violence than at first.
Three persons were killed and forty injured by cars being thrown off the track on the Hudson River Railroad, near Albany, on Saturday night.
There is a good reason to believe that the following is the protocol which has been agreed to by Mr. Johnson and Lord Stanley for the settlement of the Alabama dispute:
A Mixed Commission, consisting of eight persons appointed by Great Britain and eight persons appointed by the United States, is to sit in London and examine every claim presented, whether English or American.
Each case is to be argued by the claimant, either in person or by counsel; and the Commission will make a final award.
The questions of international law are to be referred to the arbitration of the Emperor of Russia.
The protocol now awaits the approval of Secretary Seward.
New York, Oct. 26.
An Havana letter from the 17th inst. states that the city was then quiet and the change at home decidedly popular.
The insurrection in the interior is of more importance than the authorities will admit.
The latest rising was in Santiago, and on the reception of the news considerable activity was noticeable among the troops in the barracks.
New York, Oct. 23.
Despatches from San Francisco announce another earthquake at 2 o'clock this morning.
The shock was violent, and nearly the whole population of the city rushed into the streets panic stricken, and remained there the remainder of the night.
The damage to property was not serious.
Great consternation still prevails.
A Sandwich Island letter confirms the reported subsidence of the South Eastern shore of the Island of Hawaii.
The Rev. Mr. Coan states that subsidence is plainly shown by trees which were once on dry land being now in the sea, and rocky islets once 6 feet out of water, being now submerged.
The insurrection in Cuba combines, but it is lessening, and the people are volunteering to serve against the Rebels.
