THE SITUATION.

MANY signs indicate that there will be a general election in the near future—possibly in September or October.

The government's plan of campaign is not lacking in ingenuity. It is hoped that Quebec can be made "practically solid" by means of appeals to race prejudice and liberal grants of money, and that the other provinces may be so evenly divided on party lines that the government may have a chance to successfully work the machine in respect to the electors who will hold the balance of power,—thus winning for the discredited and unpopular government party a majority in Parliament. It is well that the design of the men in office has been made so evident that intelligent electors must see it; for, seeing it, all patriotic men out of office will be the more likely to combine and co-operate to prevent it from being successfully carried out.

At the present time, the feeling of the country from end to end, is one of profound disappointment on account of the failure of the men in office to perform their promises and to fulfil the expectations they held out while in opposition. The taxpayers are disappointed because their anticipations based upon the oft-repeated promises of the Liberal leaders that expenditures and taxes would be cut down—have not been realized; because \$15,000,000 have been added to the government's expenditures, while the amount of taxes taken out of the pockets of the people has been largely increased. The temperance bodies of the country are disappointed because the Liberal promises made precedent to the plebiscite have not been fulfilled. Hundreds, if not thousands, of electors who were induced to work and vote for the Liberals on the promise of receiving offices or favors are disappointed because their requests have been treated with contempt. All who hoped to see Free Trade take the place of protection are disappointed; for the tariff is as protective as ever it was. The economists and careful who trusted the Liberal statements that the prices of imported articles would be reduced are disappointed because the prices of imported articles are higher than they were. Instead of the reign of purity which they had been led to expect by the Liberal leaders to expect, the people see a veritable carnival of corruption and jobbery.

In this situation, the duty of all those who have been disappointed, of all those who disapprove the acts of the government, of all who desire righteousness in the affairs of the nation, is to combine with the Opposition to turn the rascals out.

Action to this end ought to be taken forthwith. An Opposition candidate should be early in the field in every constituency, and organized effort ought to be made to secure the election of every Opposition candidate. Time ought not to be lost.

The Liberal Council of Great Britain has formally thrown over Irish home rule as a plank in the party platform. Mr. Gladstone's bill is characterized as open to grave objections which brought about its rejection by the British people.

The Canadian section of the Paris exhibition was kept closed on Sunday for a while to please the Sabbath observers in Canada. Now it is announced that it will be kept open on Sundays, to please those who are not Sabbath observers in Europe. As the Montreal Gazette remarks everybody will get his turn.

INDEFINITENESS AND INDECISION.

The Government press is making much fuss over the beginning of work on the Belfast and Murrey Harbor Railway. But, so little has really been done, that the people are beginning to think that it is only another attempt to bribe them away from their support of Mr. Martin, who advocated their cause so ably in and out of Parliament that the Government was literally forced to make at least a pretence of going forward with the railway. Why, the line has not even been located! The question of the loop lines remains to be settled. How or when it is to be settled no one seems to have the slightest idea. The engineer, if left to himself, would soon fix upon the route to be followed by the contractors. But there is an election in the wind, and there is no Liberal who has influence enough to induce the Government to locate the line in his favor,—ala the Hillsborough Bridge. Either that or the Government has not yet made up its mind to carry the work forward and is trying to fool the electors again.

The people are alive to the game that is being played by the Government, and will not much longer tolerate indefiniteness and indecision in regard to the loop lines.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The recent British vote for South Africa included the cost of repatriating the Imperial and Colonial troops. It is proposed to leave in South Africa 45,000 men, including 15,000 Colonials and reservists desiring to remain. The amount also included the gift of £5 to every soldier and a suit of multi to every reservist. The aggregate amount voted for the War Office is £61,022,760.

We are reminded by Halifax Herald that previous to the general election of 1896 the grits declared that no member of the House of Commons should be appointed to any office in the gift of the government. And Mr. Mulock, the present postmaster general, actually introduced a bill to make such appointments impossible, declaring, amid the cheers of his party friends, that such a power in the hands of the government completely destroyed the independence of parliament.
