Bill Passed by House of Assembly in Session of 1886.

THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY AND EXECUTIVE
COUNCIL ACT.

Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Govern-
or, Council and Assembly as follows:—

The Legislative Council of this Province
is hereby abolished.

The House of Assembly of this Province,
composed of thirty members, shall from and
after the passing of this Act, be designated
and known as "The Legislative Assembly of
Prince Edward Island."

All powers and functions, rights, immu-
nities and privileges, which are now by
law, custom, the practice of Parliament, or
otherwise vested in or exercisable by the
Legislative Council and House of Assembly
of this Province, either jointly or severally,
shall immediately after this Act shall come
into operation, as far as the same continue
in existence or are necessary and capable of
being exercised after the passing of this
Act in relation to the Legislature of this
Province, be vested in and exercisable by
the said Legislative Assembly.

The House of Assembly existing at the
passing of this Act shall, under the name
and style of "The Legislative Assembly of
Prince Edward Island," and under and
subject to the provisions of this Act, unless
sooner dissolved, continue for the period
for which it was elected; and every Legisla-
tive Assembly thereafter to be called shall
continue for the term of four years from the
day of the return of the writs for calling
the same, and no longer, subject neverthe-
less to be sooner dissolved by the Lieuten-
ant Governor or other Administrator of the
Government for the time being.

All laws in force in this Province at the
time this Act shall come into operation, re-
lating in any way to the General Assembly
of this Province, to members of the House
of Assembly, and to the election of mem-
bers to serve in the House of Assembly of
this Province, shall be held to be in force
and applicable to members of the said Legisla-
tive Assembly, to the said Legislative
Assembly, and to the election of members
to serve in the said Legislative Assembly of
Prince Edward Island, except as hereinafter
mentioned and amended.

Every person not entitled to vote under
some one of the property qualifications re-
quired by law shall, in addition to the
other qualifications requisite for such per-
son, be a bona fide resident of this Pro-
vince for a period of at least five years some
time previously to the test of the writ of
election, and during the year immediately
preceding the test of such writ of election
shall be a resident of the Electoral District,
and shall be a resident for one month of
the polling division in which he claims to
vote.

No person shall be capable of being elected
a member for any Town and Royalty or
District in this Island unless he shall, for a
period of at least twelve months immedi-
ately preceding the test of the writ for
holding the election at which such person
shall claim to be elected, have been in
seizin or possession of a freehold or lease-
hold estate within this Province of the
value of six hundred dollars over and above
all incumbrances that may affect the same,
and shall, before he be presented to take
his seat in the Legislative Assembly, take
one of the oaths prescribed for members
relative to a freehold or leasehold estate as
the nature of his qualification may require.

The words "six hundred dollars" shall be
substituted for the words "fifty pounds" in
all acts and schedules in force relating to
the qualifications of members of the House
of Assembly, and by this act made applic-
able to the Legislative Assembly of Prince
Edward Island.

Wherever in any act the words "House
of Assembly" occur, the words "Legisla-
tive Assembly" shall be substituted therefor,
and any such act shall be read and con-
strued as if the words "Legislative Assem-
bly" originally formed part thereof. The
words "and from thence to the end of the
next session of the General Assembly," or
words to the same effect used in any tem-
porary act of this Province not expired be-
fore this act shall come into operation,
shall be construed to apply to the next
session of the Legislative Assembly of this
Province.

All books, papers, journals, records and
documents belonging or in any way re-
lating to the said Legislative Council shall,
on this act coming into operation, be de-
posited in the office of the Provincial Sec-
retary of this Province for safe keeping, and
it shall be duty of the Clerk of the
said Legislative Council and of all other
officers thereof, and they are hereby
required to deliver into the custody of the
said Provincial Secretary all such books,
papers, journals, records and documents as
shall be in their custody or under their
control.

For the first election of members to serve
in the Legislative Assembly the writs shall
be issued in such form and addressed to
such returning officer as the Lieutenant
Governor in Council shall think fit; and
the sheriff or returning officer to whom
writs are directed under this act shall have
the like powers as were possessed previous
to this act coming into operation by the
officer charged with the returning of writs
for the election of members to serve in the
Legislative Council and House of Assem-
bly.

Immediately after the day of the return
of the writs for the first election of mem-
bers to serve in the said Legislative Assem-
bly, the Executive Council of this Province
then existing shall cease to exist, and the
Lieutenant Governor shall constitute and
appoint an Executive Council to be com-
posed of seven members, and every Execu-
tive Council thereafter constituted and
appointed shall consist of seven members
and no more.

The members of the said Legislative
Assembly holding the offices of Attorney
and Advocate General, Provincial Sec-
retary, Treasurer and Commissioner of Public
Lands, and Commissioner of Public Works,
respectively, shall, after the coming of this

act into operation as heretofore, be mem-
bers of the Executive Council for the time
being.

Any of the powers and duties which have
been heretofore, or may be hereafter
assigned by law to any of the officers con-
stituting, or who may hereafter constitute
the Executive Council, may from time to
time, by order of the Lieutenant Govern-
or in Council, be assigned and transferred,
either for a limited period or otherwise to
any other of the said officers by name or
otherwise.

After this act shall have come into oper-
ation the enacting part of all acts passed by
the said Legislative Assembly shall com-
mence with the words: "Her Majesty by
and with the advice and consent of the
Legislative Assembly of Prince Edward
Island enacts."

Boston Markets.

BOSTON, Oct. 9.

Eggs.—The market sustains a firm tone.
Eastern extras command 23½ to 24c per
doz. Sales of P. E. Island at 22c, and
23c is asked at the close. Canadian com-
mand 22c, and choice Western 21 to 22c.
Receipts of fresh stock are well sold up.

POTATOES.—There has been a large sup-
ply of Potatoes, and prices are a shade
easier. Houlton Rose have been selling
at 48 to 50c, and Houlton Hebrons run up
to 53c. Northern stock ranges from 45 to
48c. Sweetens have been in large supply,
with sales at \$1 25 to \$1 50 per bbl. Some
extras Jersey go a little higher.

FISH TRADE.—All kinds of fish have been
in good demand the past week, and prices
