STRAIT AT ALBERTON.—A correspondent of the 'Sunnyside Journal' writes:—A few days ago we paid a visit to Mr. Wiggins' new steam factory. The site is convenient and well chosen—being situated about 100 yards from the station, in the angle between the railway line and the main road leading to Alberton from the west. The building—65 feet long by 30 feet wide, and 30 feet high—is divided into three flats. The boiler and engine are on the ground floor. The engine is 30 horse power, built by Mr. Morrison of Summerside, and is certainly a credit to that enterprising mechanic. At the time of our visit the shingle cutter alone was in operation; and the work performed was of a superior quality. In a few weeks, however, Mr. Wiggins intends to have two pairs of mill stones (French Burr) running; also circular saws for cutting all kinds of boards, planks, etc. While still here, the necessary machinery for turning wood and iron, planing, jig-sawing, etc., is in operation. We heartily wish Mr. Wiggins all the success which his enterprising spirit deserves.

LATEST NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—At East Lynon, a well-to-do farmer, in a moment of passion yesterday, murdered his aged father and mother, and seriously, if not fatally, stabbed his wife, and subsequently put an end to his life by hanging.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Feb. 2.—A terrible tragedy occurred in Carleton this afternoon. Thomas O'Neill entered the house of his mother-in-law, John Flouge, and stabbed Mrs. Flouge in the back, so that she died in three minutes. Flouge was in the house at the time, and shouted 'murder,' when O'Neill gave him three stabs on each arm and one in the side. O'Neill was arrested a few minutes after. Flouge will probably survive. Had he not been arrested to-day, he probably would have been lynched.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—Sir John Glover has returned from Paris to London, his proposition to buy the French fisheries of Newfoundland having been declined.

It is thought that Bismarck will demand the surrender of Von Arnim from Italy, under the extradition treaty.

The health of Father Tom Bourke is much improved.

Many Spanish families are fleeing to France. The Carlists continue to shell Fort Sebastian.

The Portuguese Chamber of Peers has abolished slavery in St. Thomas and the Gulf of Guinea.

Russia has cautioned the Sultan against going to war with Montenegro.

The Carlists are still retreating, and the Austrians claim a great victory.

To-day's 'Herald' says Sir Henry Hicks, at the annual meeting of the Sutton Conservative Association last night, stated that Her Royal Highness Princess Beatrice, youngest daughter of the late Victoria, is engaged to Prince Louis of Blattenburg, now in India with the Prince of Wales; and that Parliament, at its coming session, will be asked to grant a divorce.

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—It is reported that a daughter of Dr. Howland, of Quebec, has fled with an Irish nobleman, the Earl of Dunraven, and sought concealment in this city.

The gale yesterday was severe and widespread, and much damage to property is reported in various sections of the country.

COALS TO NEW CASTLE.—MORE ACCOMMODATION.—FALSE REPORT, ETC.

OTAWA, Feb. 2.—The Toronto 'Globe' lately visited the E. I. Island, and has already begun to manifest dissatisfaction with the finding of the Supreme Court, which declares invalid the awards of the Commissioners to adjust the Land Question.

A public meeting has been held, at which several prominent members of Parliament, and others were present, and a resolution passed urging the immediate assistance of the Legislature to advise a suitable remedy for the complication.

The government is having a steamer built for use in landing ocean passengers, and mails at Rimouski. A steamer is expected to be ready on the opening of the navigation in the spring.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—The report of the engagement of Prince Arthur, the Earl of Devon and the Earl of Dunraven is unfounded.
