Inquiry Opens Into Ship Collision Off Halifax; 11 Lost From Trawler

HALIFAX, March 19 (CP)—A bobbing buoy marked the spot, tonight where a Nova Scotia fishing trawler was rammed and sunk in the early morning darkness Saturday, taking 11 of her 17 crew members to death.

Most of the trawler's crew was asleep when the crash came as she lowered sails less than a mile from the pier.

Only four bodies have been recovered—two were picked up by the Connector along with the survivors, one was washed ashore Saturday and the other was found today.

Two father-and-son teams were lost as the 150-foot Dr. Costa dipped beneath the waves swiftly following the crash.

Other victims of the crash were: Fred Crooks, Canso; Harry Cooper, Lunenburg; Morton Tanner, Blue Rocks, N. S.; Leonard Mulise, Yarmouth, N. S.; Romanus Amirault, Pubnico; and Michael Walsh, Grand Bank, Nfld.

Fellowship Awarded Former Island Doctor

An Island born physician, Dr. Raymond A. Hughes, formerly of Bedford and now of Montreal, was one of five Canadian doctors recently awarded fellowships to undertake advanced training in treatment of arthritis and other rheumatic diseases.

The Fellowship awards varying in amounts from \$1,500 to \$4,000 will be held for the period of one year. Successful candidates will begin their training in July, 1950, at the Royal Infirmary, the Massachusetts General Hospital, Sunnybrook Hospital, Toronto and the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal.

The "Ten Best" Films And Players

The Stratton Story, an MGM feature directed by Jack Cummings and produced by the late Sam Wood, sold the most tickets to Canadian theatres in 1949, a count of Canadian Film Weekly's annual boxoffice poll showed.

The film, which starred James Stewart and June Allyson, led the rest in spite of having been released with less than half of the year left.

Others who appeared in it were the late Frank Morgan, Agnes Moorehead, Bill Williams and Bruce Cowling.

Bing Crosby, for the sixth year in succession, was Canada's top movie attraction, with Bob Hope again second. During 1949 Crosby appeared in a Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court and Top O' the Morning, while Hope starred in The Paleface and Sorrowful Jones.

In a separate poll Canadian newspaper, magazine and radio critics selected Eagle-Lion's ballet drama in Technicolor, The Red Shoes, as the finest film of 1949. Produced and directed by Michael Powell and Emeric Pressburger, it starred Anton Walbrook, Moira Shearer and Marius Goring and featured Robert Helpmann, Leonide Massine and Ludmilla Tcherna.

They picked as the best actress Olivia de Havilland for her performance in the Twentieth Century-Fox production, The Snake Pit.

The Snake Pit earned an unique honor by being voted into second place by both exhibitors and critics. The former judge by earning power and the latter by artistic merit. The only other film to win a place on both polls was The Stratton Story which the critics rated sixth. Surprisingly, The Red Shoes, which caused long lineups, did not make the exhibitors' ten, but this could be due to the film not being contracted for as generally as the others.

Four of the ten chosen by the critics were British productions. This year's victory was the second in succession for a film from the United Kingdom; last year's choice having been Hamlet, also from Eagle-Lion. The Red Shoes was the only film in the critics' ten in color by Technicolor. There were four photographed in it in the box-office choices.

Two of the boxoffice favorites of 1949, Ingrid Bergman and Gregory Peck, were pushed out of the exhibitors' ten and these were replaced by June Allyson and James Stewart. Gary Cooper climbed from eighth to third and Esther Williams from tenth to sixth. Betty
