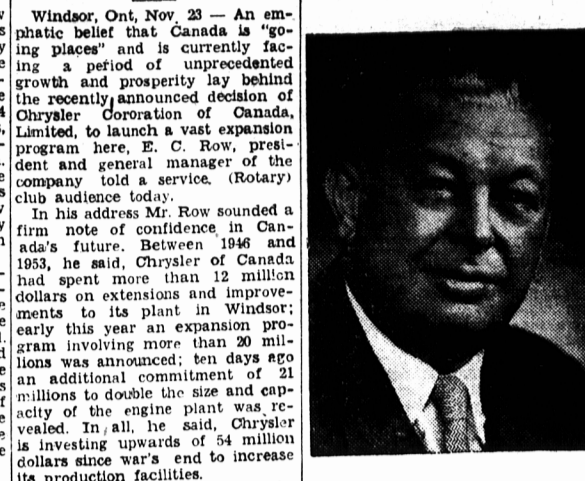

The residence is 55 feet long and 34 feet wide, providing 12 bedrooms, sitting room, reception room, main room, bathrooms, and kitchen.

There are eight bedrooms on the second floor and all other rooms are on the first floor. The new residence, under contract of County Construction Company, was begun on August 18 of this year.

All outside work has been completed, heating, plumbing and wiring installed. The inside walls are covered with gypsum, and the rooms are presently being painted.

The two-story white painted building, located as it is near the hospital and Main Street, adds greatly to the pleasing picture of the community, and will also serve as a most necessary adjunct to the hospital which serves such a wide area.
