Archbishop of Canterbury Dying.

LONDON, Nov. 29.
A bulletin issued by the Physicians says that the Archbishop of Canterbury is dying.

Montenegro and the Porte

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 29.
In consequence of a representation of the Powers Montenegro is offering to compromise matters with the Porte, viz.: The cessation by Turkey of half the Kolatchin district instead of the whole district as first demanded by Montenegro.

Gambetta Accidentally Shoots Himself

PARIS, Nov. 29.
M. Gambetta accidentally shot himself with a revolver yesterday. The wound in his left hand is ghastly and painful, and he is suffering from fever in consequence.

Detective Cox's Funeral.

DUBLIN, Nov. 29.
The funeral of Detective Cox, shot by Dowling on the 26th, inst., took place today. It was largely attended and was the cause of much excitement in the city.

Rivers and Streams Bill.

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.
In the Supreme Court, to-day, judgment was given on the case of McLaren vs. Caldwell, under the Rivers and Streams Act. The judgment upholds the right of Mr. McLaren to the use of the river improved by him.

Canada Pacific Railway.

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.
The Canada Pacific Railway Syndicate have decided to increase the capital of the Company from twenty five millions to one hundred million dollars.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 27.
The Times' Dublin correspondent says that Ryan was arrested in Barbazon Row, in a house where arms were seized some time ago. He has served in the American army. It is evident from the circumstances connected with the murder of Detective Cox that it will be necessary for the authorities to keep the body of constables sufficiently strong to deal effectually with more deliberate attempts likely to be made to shoot the police. It will be a life and death struggle between authority and reckless ruffianism.

The Daily News' Alexandria correspondent states that several drunken British soldiers stationed at Ramleh, while returning to their headquarters, beat an Arab who has since died of his injuries.

PARIS, Nov. 27.
A despatch from Vienna, published in semi-official form, states that Foid Pacha and Kia-Mil Pacha have been arrested at Constantinople. The former was lately entrusted with special business to Vienna.

Two thousand members of French trade unions assembled yesterday and extended a greeting to twelve delegates from English unions who came to Paris to represent the views of the latter bodies in favor of the completion of the channel tunnel.

A bill has been distributed in the Deputies containing, among other signatures, those of Gambetta and Paul Bert, giving all persons the right to leave testamentary instructions as to whether their bodies shall be buried or cremated.

LONDON, Nov. 27.
Clevedon Hall, the residence of Sir Arthur Elton, situated near Bristol, has been destroyed by fire. A portion of the library, considered one of the most valuable in England, is also burned.

DUBLIN, Nov. 27.
In the police court to-day, Devine, Woodward and Ryan were arraigned and charged with the murder of Cox. Detective Eastwood identified Devine but was not sure about the other two. The prisoners were remanded.

Seven judges, who had been dining in Mount Joy square, passed the spot where the murderers of Detective Cox had been loitering a few minutes after the affray happened, and it is thought the murderers were laying in wait for them.

LONDON, Nov. 27.
In the Commons, Mr. Trevelyan said the recent speech of Mr. Redmond, at Cork, in which the latter advocated Boycotting and revolution was under consideration of the Government.

Mr. Gladstone moved the first seven and last three procedure rules be made a standing order. Motion agreed to.

It is authoritatively denied that Richard O'Shaughnessy was ever offered the permanent under secretaryship for Ireland.

DUBLIN, Nov. 27.
A mob attacked the hospital in which Dolan is confined and attempted to force an entrance. The police cleared the streets. An additional military guard has been placed at Dublin Castle to-night.

LONDON, Nov. 27.
A train on the North Scotland Railway, which left Maudslayi at 4 o'clock this afternoon, fell through the bridge at Fyvie. Fourteen persons were killed and many injured. The engine passed over in safety but all the carriages were wrecked.

The French steamer Camborne, belonging in Nantes, was sunk by collision in Bristol Channel to-day. Fourteen persons were drowned.
