They accused Britain of inflaming relations after weeks of comparative quiet in order to influence the current Big Three foreign ministers conference in Washington.

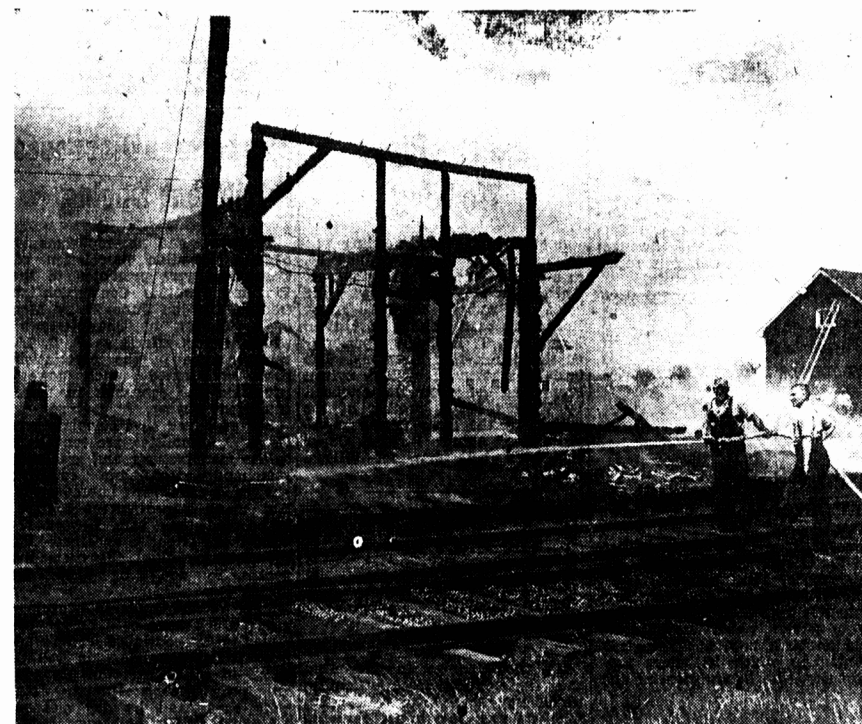
