Wm. McLennan Heads Eastern Price County Breeding Club

President Clarence Marchbank of New Annapolis presided at the annual meeting of the Eastern Price County Artificial Breeding Club held Wednesday evening, May 1st at the Legion Home in Summerside. The report of the inseminator Ken Walker was given, which showed that 1,980 cows were bred artificially for year ending March 31st, 1957. This is an increase of 800 cows over the previous year. In addition to this increase, the territory has been divided, thus making a smaller area covered.

A total of 333 farmers belong to the club and breed cows during the past year. Dr. George Fisher, Director of Veterinary Service for the Island was the guest speaker and reviewed the growth of A.I. (artificial insemination) on the Island. With the origin of the Eastern Price County Club, in June 1955, it grew to nine clubs in 1956 and at the present time two new clubs are in the process of getting underway, making a total of 11 clubs in all.

At a director's meeting immediately followed the annual meeting Bill McLennan of Albany was elected president for the ensuing year. Walter Bernard was elected vice-president and Frank Jardine, secretary-treasurer, for another year.

Comments of Adjudicators. In discussing the performance of Class 20, in which only one half of the choruses were present, Dean Collins remarked that the group "had good voices, but were not well co-ordinated, good artistry is playing ball with one another and listening to one another. The group, however, showed enthusiasm and vitality."

In Class 19, the adjudicators thought the Choral "an exceptionally good choir, which has been able to capture some of the quality of a teenage choir and blend it with the colour of an adult women's choir."

In commenting on Class 204, Dr. Bell stated "this has turned out to be a rather gratifying evening in that this contestant is self taught." "The reading had been extremely accurate and musical, and has been meticulously studied," he said.

Regarding Class 61, Dean Collins stated "there are very few contraltos I know of who do a good job on this piece - they don't seem to get the right spirit. The voice, and time were good, but the contestant seemed as if she were just going through motions - she should show excitement in such a piece. P.E.I., however, may well be proud of her and I am sure she has a very bright future."

In Class 67, the contestant who placed first was described as having "a beautiful voice together with excellent musical sense," and the adjudicator recommended that she continue with her musical career. In regard to the contestant who placed second, the adjudicator said she "gave an excellent interpretation of the selection, and has a voice that could easily be developed."

At the conclusion of the program, Dean Collins, who leaves the Island tomorrow, stated that he was "very happy to have been on the Island, and I am sorry that my time here has come to an end. I thank you all for your great kindness and have enjoyed your music very much indeed."

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Road Project, Daylight Time Discussed At S'side

With the president C. R. MacLagan presiding the Summerside Board of Trade held its regular monthly meeting last night in the plant Telephone Company Ltd. This was in accordance with the system adopted some time ago by the Board to hold its meetings at the various places of business in Summerside so that the members can become better acquainted with the business interests of the other members of the Board.

Regarding the matter of the rebuilding of the road, Wilmot by Reads Corner to Walkers farm in New Annapolis and from Reads Corner to Summerside, the secretary read a letter from the Minister of Highways stating that at present he was not in a position to give any information on the matter. The Minister stated further "we did have the road from Wilmot to Walkers farm on our program last year but owing to pressure of work on the Trans Canada Highway, it was impossible to get supervision for this job. Our plan, when we do this section, is to start the widening and grading early in the spring so that we can complete the concrete during the summer season."

It was the consensus of opinion of the members that this matter should not be dropped but should be followed up by the local board.

Many Vehicles Are Stalled In Snow Drifts In S'side Area

The storm which swept over the Maritimes on Wednesday night and yesterday as well, tied up traffic in Prince County and many cars east and west of Summerside were stalled in snow drifts and had to be towed out by tractor and by other means. Travelling to the R.C.A.F. station in the morning was accomplished with considerable difficulty as cars were able to navigate by noon.

East of Summerside the situation was much more difficult and cars were reported stalled all along the highway. Road officials said last night that plows were working to clear the highway and it was hoped that traffic from Summerside to Charlottetown would be open by morning but that everything depended on weather conditions. The heavy wet snow made it difficult to make rapid progress.

Snow Blocks Some Roads In West Prince. Several inches of wet sticky snow Wednesday night and strong winds Thursday blocked the main highway in the vicinity of Elmsdale and made heavy going on all roads. No plows were out in the western part of the Province and it was not till about five o'clock in the afternoon that the paved road was opened by heavy trucks.

Lobster boats in the area here between Alberton and Tignish were kept ashore by a driving north west storm but fishermen were optimistic regarding damage to their newly set lobster gear with the exception of traps set close inshore in shoal waters. First lobsters are expected to be landed today.

GOOD CHURCH YEAR. TORONTO (CP)—The Presbyterian Church in Canada reports that its income since 1949 has doubled and it put at more than \$9,525,000 the national congregational contribution in 1956, the largest one-year gain in the church's history. Contribution per member averaged \$50.54. There now are 188,448 registered adherents, a report said.

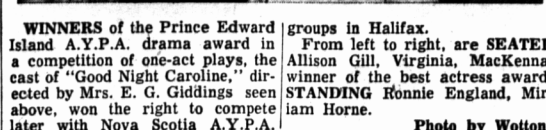

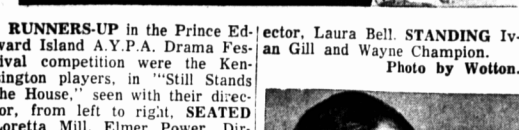
