Coal dealers in Ottawa have given notice of an advance of fifty cents per ton in price.

The Toronto Exhibition will be opened on Wednesday next by Lieut. Governor Robinson.

The chronic discontent and disturbance of natives chiefs in Zululand causes grave anxiety.

Work on four sections of the Panama Canal has been entirely abandoned, owing to yellow fever among the workmen.

The Atlantic Sugar Refinery commenced operations at Halifax a few days ago. Thirty hands are employed in the works.

The drought is so severe at Bordentown, N. J., that not a vestige of green can be seen in some fields. Everything is drying up.

Two criminals escaped from Halifax jail on Saturday and are still at large. One was awaiting trial for burglarizing a chapel, and the other was charged with stabbing the mate of a ship.

At Silver Lakes, Wisconsin, on Sunday, a concert was struck by lightning, and the building destroyed. The inmates, eighty in number, escaped. The loss is estimated at \$55,000.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.

Official Bulletin, 8.30 p. m.—The President vomited once last evening and once about an hour after midnight. Notwithstanding this disturbance, he slept well the most of the night and this morning has taken food by the mouth with nausea, and has retained it.

Official Bulletin, 12.30 p. m.—The President's condition has not changed materially since last Bulletin was issued, and there has been no further gastric disturbance.

Official Bulletin, 6.30 p. m.—The President passed a comfortable day. He has taken his food with some relish, and had no return of irritability of the stomach reported in the morning bulletin. The parotid swelling continues to improve and is now so far reduced that the contour of the face is restored. The wound shows no material change. The rise of temperature this p. m. has very slight, but the pulse is more frequent throughout the day than yesterday, or the day before, and he showed more fatigue after dressing. Pulse 110; temperature 98; respiration 10.

It has been definitely decided to remove the President to Long Branch between tomorrow and Wednesday if everything continues favorable.

Blaine sent the following cablegram to-night to Lowell, Minister at London: Last night the President did not rest well and twice during the night the stomach was so disturbed that he vomited. During to-day he has been better. The surgeons do not think he has lost ground but he certainly has not gained since last night's despatch.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.

Later advices from Camp Thomas corroborate the reported massacre of most of Gen. Carr's command by Apaches.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 4.

A despatch, dated Tucson, Sept. 4, says: The Star has just received the following: Thomas, A. T., reports from the vicinity of Fort Apache respecting the hostiles are confirmed. There are fresh arrivals of Indians runners, but no message from Major Cochrane or the troops sent to relieve him. In their attack on the post, the Indians were recklessly brave and defiant, one of them riding Gen. Carr's horse into the parade ground wheeling and firing as he passed out. He is a brother of Cirina and is a Mexican captive among the Apaches. Troops are being hurried forward and strong reinforcements are needed. A report comes in that in the attack on the post, a Lieutenant and seven men were killed. If this is true, it was probably Lieut. Gordon of the sixth cavalry.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 4.

Archbishop Croke, and the Bishop of Ross, who are in London, are about to visit Mr. Davitt.

Bishop Nulty, of Meath, has written to Mr. Parnell stating that although the Land Bill is incomplete it ought to have a fair trial. The Bishop advises the electors of Tyrone County to reject Mr. Dickson, Home Rule candidate for member of Parliament.

LIMERICK, Sept. 1.

A conflict has taken place between the police and the public caused by some soldiers making insulting remarks about the Pope. The police fired upon some persons throwing stones, and fifteen persons were wounded, some dangerously.

LONDON, Sept. 4.

Bonfires were lighted over a large portion of North Ireland on Saturday night, as a mark of gratitude to Gladstone for the Land Act.

PARIS, Sept. 4.

The result of twenty-one second ballots taken to-day show that twenty Republicans and one Conservative have been elected. The Monarchist's loss two seats, and the Bonapartists lose one.

LONDON, Sept. 3.

It is intended to confer the Grand Cross order of St. Michael and St. George upon Sir John A. Macdonald in recognition of his services as Canadian Premier.
