Prompt Action Quells Fire At Race Track In S'side The heroic efforts of a young Summerside man, together with the value of police radio were emphasized in a fire that had its origin in one of the barns at the Summerside Race Track last evening.

As crowds of hockey fans filled into the Civic Stadium to attend the Summerside - Parkdale hockey game a couple of children shouting "fire!" came dashing up to the Summerside police patrol manned by Constables Elmer Matheson, Stewart Berry, and Ralph Hardy doing traffic duty in the rink area. Ascertaining the location of the fire one of the officers reached into the patrol, picked up the radio and advised the police station of the fire. Instantly the fire siren roared and a thunderous summons to members of the fire department who immediately were aboard fire trucks heading for the racetrack.

Meanwhile 18-year-old Art Rogers, who trains and drives horses at the Summerside track, smashed his way into the shed where a fire was burning. He hurt his arm in the process, but entered the building, guided only by the light of the fire which was located between a large tractor and the mobile starting gate which were situated in an alleyway extending the length of the building.

Without regard to danger Rogers fought the flames and heavy smoke, and had the fire in hand when the fire trucks roared up to the door within four or five minutes from the time the first cry of fire was heard from the children. In extinguishing this fire before it made much progress, a severe loss was undoubtedly averted because the building in which the fire was contained is situated among several other buildings which comprise the race track stables in which horses are kept.
