vested between Jan. 1 and June 14 are admitted duty-free during that period. A duty of 37½ cents a hundredweight applies the balance of the year.

**WROTE FINANCE MINISTER**

In a letter to H. L. Parker, secretary of the Nova Scotia Potato Growers Association Finance Minister Fleming said "Tariff negotiations are now proceeding with respect to the tariff board's recommendation."

Mr. Parker says potato prices in the Maritime provinces are at distress levels because of the U.S. surplus. The nearness of large stocks in the neighboring state of Maine tends to lower Maritime prices even further, he contends.

Maritime prices are controlled by those in central Canadian markets. Current wholesale prices for New Brunswick potatoes at Montreal are \$1.55 to \$1.60 for 75-pound bags.

The wholesale price at Halifax is \$1.45-\$1.50 and at Sydney \$1.60-\$1.75. The retail price is about 25 cents higher. Growers say they are getting less than their cost of production and marketing.

**TOUGH ON FARMERS**

Mr. Parker says low prices for potatoes affect Maritime farmers just as severely as low wheat prices do western farmers. New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and the Annapolis Valley of Nova Scotia are big producing areas, growing almost half the Canadian crop.

Canadian production in 1957 was 44,077,000 hundredweight. This year's output dropped to 39,430,000 of which the Mari-

# Giants' Roosevelt Grier Is Doubtful Starter Sun.

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Roosevelt Grier, 270-pound defensive tackle of New York Giants, was placed on the doubtful list for Sunday's title game with Baltimore because of knee and arm injuries.

Grier was unable to participate in Tuesday's workout at Yankee Stadium. Coach Jim Lee Howell said the loss of Grier would be a terrific blow.

Chances are Grier will come around in time for the big game for the National Football League championship. If not, he will be replaced by M. L. Brackett or rookie Frank Youso.

Bob Mischak, a starting guard on offense; Kyle Rote, one of the offensive ends, and Alex Webster, a regular halfback, also were unable to work with the club. Mis-

chak has a sore toe, Rote a knee injury and Webster's legs are well battered.

**ONLY GRIER DOUBTFUL**

"I would say only Grier is on the doubtful list," said Howell. Howell has plenty of respect for the Colts, who beat the Giants twice in exhibition games.

"They have a great passer in Johnny Unitas," he said. "He has the touch and knows just when to throw. He can get rid of the ball fast."

Did he expect anything new from Baltimore?

"They use a lot of crazy stuff, flea flickers and things like that. Some of the boys call it wild west football. But they are a solid team with great blocking and the best defensive team, excepting our own, in league in Gino Marchetti. Their big men crash in with speed and make you throw the ball up in the air. Then their smaller men (defensive backs)

## Violence Merks Miami Strike

**MIAMI, Fla. (AP)**—A barrage of bullets struck the automobile of a United Steel workers organizer Tuesday as he drove along a lonely stretch of road in suburban Opa-Locka.

The organizer, Estes Riffe, 26, was not hit by the bullets but two hours later, while talking to

police, he suffered a heart attack. "I just feel grateful to God that I am still around," the 230-pound Riffe told reporters who talked to him in a hospital.

Two charges of assault and battery have been filed against Riffe in connection with violence during a Steelworkers' strike at the Adams Engineering Company here.

Since the strike started, shot-gun blasts have been fired into the homes of three non-union workers, tear gas bombs were thrown into two others, and two employees' cars were damaged. Plant officials have complained of sabotage.
