Farm Forum Plans

The Farm Forum Committee met Monday afternoon to chart the course for the study group ship for the coming season.

The committee enthusiasm and optimism is in part due to the willingness of other provincial organizations, and in particular the Women's Institutes to accept Farm Forum as a study group program that can be adapted to general use.

One of the most important decisions arrived at was that of holding leadership short courses during the latter part of November in O'Leary, Kensington, Hunter River, Vernon River, Murray River, Mount Stewart, and Souris.

Farm Forum's National Secretary Floyd Griesbach, will be in the Province to attend these courses which will also serve the purpose of acquainting representatives from many districts with the possibilities of Farm Forum as a study group program.

Farm Forum Program

The Farm Forum season will be introduced on Monday night at the usual time by a pre-season broadcast, which will pave the way for the regular sessions starting on Monday November 2nd, when the topic will be "The Agricultural Representative and the Farmer."

This discussion will attempt to assess the relationship between the farmer and agricultural workers in the various departments of Government.

The leading questions will attempt to discover:
(a) What use farmers make of the services offered by fieldman.
(b) The kind of help farmers expect from fieldman.
(c) What farmers and Forums can do to help the fieldman reach more people.

Forum groups are urged to meet on November 2nd, for an early start and regular Monday night sessions throughout the winter.

Monday Night Is Study Night

Farm Radio Forum on Monday night runs into competition from a wide variety of other activities many of which could possibly be held on some other night in the week.

There was a problem that the Forum committee dealt with briefly and recommended that the co-operation of other groups would be sought in keeping Monday night clear as the one night in the week for the study of problems in rural communities.

As Farm Forum grows in popularity and public acceptance, it will no doubt more readily stake a claim for its night in the week, but in the meantime it can be other groups to plan their gatherings.

Potato Truckage

In view of the fact that the initial price of 45 cents per bushel applies to potatoes delivered at shipping point it is vitally important to the farmer that movement from the farm be done as economically as possible.

There is reason to believe that in some instances in the past that dealers and assemblers were quite generous in their allowance for this service, but for this season with its low returns the producer should not be called upon to pay more than the hauling actually costs.

Questions and Answers

Despite meetings and broadcasts there is still no doubt a number of farmers who do not have the answers to all the questions that may arise in connection with the operations of the potato pool and the agency.

So far as possible the Federation office will answer mail enquiries and is opened to discuss these matters personally with members who call.

The next month will be a cooling off period or a time of decision for many growers, but at the end of that period the decision must be arrived at to join up or go in alone and take the chance of better prices.

Main Advantages

The two chief advantages in joining the Pool may be stated briefly, as follows:
1. The guarantee of a minimum price regardless of how low the market may be.

2. The assurance of receiving the average price and a final payment should the market be above the initial payment.

The chief disadvantage that will appeal to some farmers will be the one of not realizing the highest market price should a sale be made at that particular time.
