S'ide Harbour Gets New Light

The C.G.S. "Brant" Department of Transport buoy and light-house supply steamer, Captain G. A. Arsenault, Master, left Charlottetown Thursday morning (May 23rd) with a load of buoys for placing in the Northumberland Strait areas and Bays from Charlottetown west as far as Miramichi Bay. The "Brant" places and maintains the unlighted buoys, such as conicals, gans, and spars, and the smaller lighted buoys.

The placing of the Agency buoys this spring has been considerably delayed because of ice conditions.

When in the vicinity of Summerside, the "Brant" will place a new electric-lighted buoy at the entrance to the Harbour, just west of the Indian Point breakwater light. This buoy will show a flashing Red light. It is considered that the establishment of this buoy will be of considerable assistance to safe navigation into the harbour at night.

Mr. Gordon Upstone, Mechanic Marine Signals, who will be aboard the "Brant," will be servicing lighthouse equipment and making new installations en route.

PROGRESS REPORT BY TCA
