NEWS NOTES.

An Ottawa despatch declares that railway mail clerks will make another effort this year to secure an increase of salary. Reports received at the Indian department are to the effect that cattle on the Northwest ranches are standing the winter well.

Georgia exports every year over \$1,000,000 worth of watermelons. The same state sends out every year about 1,000,000 bales of cotton and cuts every year 200,000,000 feet of lumber.

Massachusetts has over 100,000 persons engaged in the fisheries. The making of boots and shoes gives employment to 62,000; cotton goods, 58,000; building, 50,000; clothing, 33,000.

Mr. Yates Thompson, formerly owner of the Pall Mall Gazette, has offered £15,000 for the addition of a large chapel to Westminster Abbey, where future memorials and monuments may be erected.

The prohibition plebiscite in Nova Scotia will, all indications show, result in a prohibition victory. In Cumberland County a prohibition majority of as high as seven to one is estimated; and of three to one throughout the province.

A despatch from Buenos Ayres says that the government cruiser Nichoray has landed all her men at Cabo Paso, 25 miles north of Rio. Other government vessels are making their way toward Rio as rapidly as possible. The size of Rio has been abolished.

In England they are beginning to find difficulty in providing qualified crews for the increasing size of the fleet. This may be a serious difficulty for more than English naval authorities. Money can build ships very rapidly, but money only can provide the men fit to man them.

A French engineer has suggested a plan for completing the Panama canal by which he will carry off the excavated earth through a tunnel into which he will turn the Chagres River. The managers of the company's remains do not take kindly to his idea. They probably think enough of their money has gone into holes of the earth without digging any more.

The State Farmers' Institute of Minnesota has been listening to and passing resolutions approving of advice given them to pay more attention to mixed farming. This kind of advice is given by the Dominion ministers to the farmers of the Canadian Northwest, adjoining Minnesota, was a cause of much hilarity to the Canadian Opposition press. The Memphis Knights of Labor have started a movement for deporting the colored people of the United States to Africa. As there are about nine million negro citizens in the United States and only about thirty thousand Knights of Labor, the latter are to be congratulated on the boldness of their undertaking rather than on the likelihood of its amounting to anything.

The English advisers of the Khedive are going on steadily with the reform of Egyptian government, and already considerable progress has been made. Instead of judges gaining their seats by bribery or favoritism, and administering justice on the same lines, only competent men are appointed, and if they do not keep straight they are sent about their business. The country has a summary jurisdiction which has been established both for civil and criminal cases, have brought justice within the reach of the poor, and the improvement of the system has been manifested both in the increase of the relative proportion of convictions and the decrease of actual crime, especially of highway robbery. Whatever the Khedive may think of the British advisers, his subjects will be sorry to lose the boon of security of life and property, and even-handed justice for rich and poor alike.

THE ARMIES OF EUROPE.

The military statistics of the European nations supply a suggestive object lesson in relation to our present civilization. The importance of the war footing of Europe cannot be overestimated. In case of a general war, the principal belligerent nations of Europe, excluding Turkey, could hurl 14,991,000 men into the contest. The standing army alone of the greater European nations consists of 3,274,000 men. Russia leads the list, her "peace footing" or standing army consists of 868,000 men. These soldiers are drawn from a population of 124,000,000. The enormous strength of this army may be shown by comparing it with the army of Rome during the palmy days of the empire. The permanent military force of Rome on sea and land was only 450,000. France comes next to Russia, the strength of the army being 600,000 men. This army is drawn from and charged upon a population of 35,500,000. The Chauvinistic spirit of the French people has been somewhat modified by the increased permanent military force of Germany, which now numbers 596,000 men drawn from a population of 49,900,000. Austria, with Hungary, comes next, the army numbering 326,000 men, the population of the monarchy being 41,000,000. Fifth on the list comes Italy, whose armies number 247,000 men, drawn from a population of 30,000,000. England, notwithstanding her naval superiority, comes only sixth on the list, the population being 30,000,000 and the standing army 247,000. Spain has an army of 115,000 men, drawn from a population of 17,500,000.
