Valdez Stops McMurtry At 2:39 Of First Round

NEW YORK (AP)—Big Nino Valdez overhauled Pat McMurtry with a devastating attack to stop the Tacoma, Wash., boxer in 2:39 of the first round Friday night at Madison Square Garden. Valdez weighed 213, McMurtry 188 pounds.

Valdez dropped McMurtry with a left hook to the head near the midway mark of the opening round and floored him again with a right hand and, following two hooks, as Nino swarmed over his man, McMurtry tumbled to one knee, bounced up and reeled against the ropes as referee Harry Kessler stopped it.

It was the first time the 26-

year-old McMurtry had been stopped in 34 pro fights.

CONTROLS ACTION
 Using his 25-pound weight advantage and superior reach and Valdez controlled the action all the way. He chased McMurtry from the opening bell, digging a left to the body. When Pat bounced back with a jab, Nino moved in and dropped him with a short left hook.

The bewildered Pat got up quickly at two but was forced to take the automatic eight-count by referee Kessler. Valdez rammed two hooks to the body and head and then drove home a right in the chin that floored Pat for the

second time. He took the count, on one knee, getting up at nine. As Valdez went after him again, McMurtry suddenly fell back near the ropes and dropped to one knee. As he got up, Valdez moved in and Pat reeled away. Referee Kessler quickly stopped it to save Pat from further punishment.

QUICK ENDING
 "He wasn't able to protect himself," said Kessler after the fight. Under New York rules, it is mandatory to stop a fight after three knockdowns in the same round.

Bobby Glasson, Valdez' manager who had proclaimed the budding Cuban "champion of the world" by his own decree earlier in the week, immediately started yelling for a title match with Floyd Patterson. A Havana promoter has offered Patterson \$400,000 to defend, presumably against a winning Valdez in the Cuban capital during the winter.

Valdez is rated No. 2 among the challengers by Ring and No. 4 by the National Boxing Association. McMurtry, who won into the fight with a fine 30-21 record, was ranked by the NBA.

Valdez, a 7-10-5 favorite, has won six straight, his career record of 47-15-2.

Aces, we are inclined to believe, are too powerful with Charlottetown divided into five teams. We think that no more than four teams from the City should be in an Island loop with the Aces. Even that is spreading the Charlottetown talent out pretty well.

Our friends in Summerside certainly have no objection to this. In fact, they were perfectly willing to go along with an Island League and had no objections to Charlottetown assembling in one outfit the strongest team they could muster. The Aces weren't saying they could beat the cream of the capital city but they were making it known that they were willing to give it the old try.

Moncton Hawks Defeat Miramichi Beavers 4-2

NEWCASTLE (CP) — Goalie Ray Steeves made 41 saves here Friday night to spark Moncton Hawks to a 4-2 win over Miramichi Beavers in a North Shore Hockey League game.

The win boosted Moncton into a second place deadlock with the Beavers. Both have an even dozen points. Tonight the Beavers visit Bathurst for a game with the league leading Papermakers.

Moncton and Miramichi battled to a 1-1 deadlock in the first 20 minutes and the Hawks led 4-2 after two periods. There was no scoring in the third session.

Moncton goals were evenly divided between playing coach Ron Gaudet, Gerry Boss, Bob Hopper and Ed Belliveau. Ralph Miles and Bud Stuart shot the Miramichi goals.

One minute and 32 seconds after the opening faceoff, Belliveau concerted passes from Gaudet and Mullins for the first Moncton goal. Play was taking place in the Hawks' end when Mullins got his stick on the puck and carried to centre ice. He relayed to Gaudet crossing the line. The fiery Moncton playing-coach outguessed Tyshko and passed over to Belliveau in the clear.

With less than five minutes remaining in the frame, Stuart shot the Beaver equalizer after taking a pass from Gauvin inside the Moncton line. A close-in shot caught Steeves off guard. The first period was fast with

some clean body checks being dished out by both clubs. No penalties were called by referees Haining and Kelly.

Moncton pulled into a comfortable 4-2 lead in the second period as the Hawks blasted seven shots at MacTavish, hitting the mesh for three goals.

Boss broke the 1-1 deadlock when he scored at 1:56 after taking passes from Gaudet and Mullins. The assists were the second of the night for Gaudet and Mullins.
