

Inhuman Treatment of a Child.

We learn from the Quotidian of Levis that on Tuesday evening a number of respectable people, residents of Levis, complained to the police of the inhuman treatment of a young child by a man and woman who had her in charge. The police arrested the parties complained of, who gave their name as Maurice Chaput and Etta Chaput, and that they were man and wife, and that they were married at Moncton N. B. On the child being examined, black marks were found on its little body and neck. The child, who is only about two or three years of age, was taken charge of by the good Sisters of Charity, and the inhuman couple remanded until yesterday morning, when they were brought before His Honor Judge Chauveau. They denied having treated the child cruelly and claimed to have purchased it for \$2 at Campbellton, N. B. On the accused agreeing to relinquish all claims on the child they were with a severe reprimand and caution discharged, promising to leave the town immediately. The accused were travelling around the country, gipsy fashion, he being an acrobat and his supposed wife telling fortunes; meantime the poor little baby was compelled to act the contortionist.—Quebec Chronicle.

Mr. Angus, Mr. Van Horne, and Mr. Egan, returned from the end of the track of the Canadian Pacific Railway last week. The line is now built to a point seventy-five miles beyond Calgary at the foot of the Rocky Mountains. It is estimated that during the present season 864 miles of road will be constructed. By the end of this month the grading will have been completed to the summit of the mountains, and about two weeks later trains will be running to that point. The total number of miles completed to date in 1,905 and the number under construction 984. The Manitoba South-western division will probably be carried to Whitewater lake next season. Surveyors have already been sent in to that region.

Prince Bismarck's dog, who established for himself a rather doubtful reputation by nearly killing Prince Gortschakoff at the Berlin Congress, has been at one of his pranks again. This time the too free use of his teeth did not result in the same portentous consequences as his former loss of temper would have done, although death ensued. The famous Reichshund attacked and killed the dog of a Gastain householder. Bismarck, who witnessed the scene, punished his dog severely, and after a few days called on the owner of the dead dog, apologised for the savagery of the Reichshund, and promised a new and better specimen in place of the slain hound. 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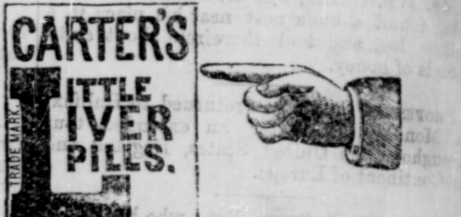
