Dow Jones reports that crude oil output in week ending July 23 averaged 20,000 bbls less per day than was produced in the preceding week. Cram's report shows that automobile output rose over 5,000 units over preceding week. Dividend meetings scheduled for today include U. S. Steel Pfd, Borden Company, Deere Pfd, Inland Steel, National Lead and Union Bag and Paper. Although some correction may develop in the stock market today or tomorrow we do not expect any pro-

longed reaction and feel prices are going higher. Favor such stocks as U. S. Steel, Beth Steel, New York Central, Southern and Northern Pacific, General Electric, Al-lis Chalmers, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, American Steel Foundries, North American, Columbia Gas and Am Waterworks. TORONTO, Ont., July 28—East Malartic—Cross cutting on the first level in No 1 shaft at East Malartic has intersected the two veins north and south of the shaft at a distance indicated by diamond drilling. The veins are 15 and 30 feet wide and people close to this picture are bullish. Well informed calibre of buying in market at present time.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, July 28.—Prices sagged in today's stock market as volume decreased to about 18,000 shares compared with more than 30,000 in the preceding session. Most liquors and a few utilities held up fairly well, but easing tendencies were exhibited by metals, rails, papers and banks. Constructions were mixed. Canadian Car Preferred dropped to 19 1/2, off 1 1/2 while the common eased slightly. C. P. R. closed even at 13. A minor gain was shown by Canada Northern Power at 25 1/2 after publication of a favorable report of earnings for the first six months of the current fiscal year. Canadian Hydro-Electric Preferred jumped more than a point to 40 1/2. Minor losses were posted for Shawinigan, Power Corporation and B. C. Power, Brazilian and Montreal firmed to finish even. Light demand sent building products up a fraction to 41, new high, while Dominion Bridge firmed a little. Cement and Gypsum declined narrowly while in metals, losses of about 1/2 went up for International Nickel and Noranda. St. Lawrence Paper preferred lost the maximum fraction at 37. Dryden advanced a bit to 4 1/2 while in liquors, Canadian Industrial Alcohol issues and National Breweries improved fractionally. Stock exchange sales 18,170 shares; bonds \$2,800.

Currencies

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, July 28—With attention still riveted on the Spanish revolt, foreign gold currencies softened against the United States dollar today. French francs, Holland guilders and Swiss francs yielded ground. The pound sterling edged forward a minor fraction. Spanish control agencies maintained the peseta at unchanged levels. Dominion funds eased 1-64 per cent to 99 63-64 cents, pounds sterling gained 1-16 cent to \$5.01 13-16 while French francs lost 00 1-4 of a cent to 61 cents.

PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, July 28—Trend of butter prices was easier on Montreal open produce markets today while potatoes advanced. Eggs were firm and cheese quiet and unchanged. Butter was quoted about 23 1-2 cents per pound for carlots or less of no 1 while lots to retailers were 24 for solids and 24 1-2 for prints. Graded egg shipments in carlots or less were quoted at 27 to 27 1-2 cents a dozen for A large, 25 to 26 1-2 for A medium, 22 to 23 for C and 20 to 21 for C. Cheese was quoted at 13 1-4 to 1-2 for Ontarios and 13 to 13 1-4 for Quebecs, all prices nominal. New Quebec potatoes were \$1.45 to \$1.50 per 80 pound bag.

MINING

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, July 28—The mining market was unable to absorb the run of profit-taking today without price declines and at the close both index groups were down, the golds narrowly while miscellaneous mines took a loss of 1.86 to 143.34. Trade in the medium-lum price goods was featured by a turnover of 81,000 shares of Hard Rock on a decline of 23 cents to 3.28. The day's low was 3.25 and the high 3.57. Other leaders down were O'Brien off 15 to 4.60, Beattie, off 6 to 1.44, Macassa, off 15 to 4.65 and Freeport off 15 to 1.75. Lead-Authier also lost 8 and other mild losers were Buffalo-Ankerite, Canadian Malartic, Coniarum, Contagas, God's Lake, Gunnar, McKenzie Red Lake, Mining Corporation and New Gold rose, Red Lake and San Antonio. Narrow gains were showing at the close for McIntyre, Hollinger, Dome, Tuck Hughes and Wright Hargreave, Bralorne, Pickle Crow, Pioneer, Sylvanite and Premier were all up, and in the penny list closings, prices were higher for Shawkey, Bidgood Kirkland, Central Porcupine, Greene Stabell, Manitoba-Eastern, Quebec Mining, Sladen Malartic and Central Manitoba. In sympathy with other world markets. Values closed 1 3-8 to 1 1-2 cents higher, with July at 95 7-8, October 95 3-8 to 1-2 and December 94 3-4 cents a bushel. In cash wheat, improved spreads of 1-4 to 1 cents were reported on no 4 northern and nos. 5 and 6 wheat, while durums were quoted unchanged to 1-2 cent better. Pit trade in coarse grains showed all futures values at substantial gains at the high points. Mill buying in oats and export business in barley were recorded. Investment purchases supported all commodities.

TOURING BY MOTOR NOW LESS COSTLY

NEW YORK, July 28—(CP)—American automobile tourists spend \$4,000,000,000 a year according to a report from the American Automobile Association. There are 40,000,000 motorists touring the highways in the country this year, and they spend, en route, an average of \$100 each. This is one of the diversions that have gone down in cost very materially. It is only about one-half of what it was 15 years ago. The increase in motor touring during the last few years is in no small part the result of the reduction in the cost of car operation. It is estimated the average motorist with \$100 to spend, can now travel more than twice as far and see twice as much of the country as he could 15 years ago.

LIVESTOCK

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, July 28—Calves were 25 cents higher in early trading on Montreal livestock markets today while other divisions held steady. Receipts: Cattle, 116; calves, 186; sheep and lambs 30; hogs 404. Steers ranged from \$4 for common to \$5.25 and \$5.50 for medium good to good. Good cows sold up to \$4.25 with plain kinds around \$3. Butchers sold at \$2.50 while canners and cutters were from \$1.50 to \$1.75. Bulls were steady at \$2.50 to \$3. Grass calves made from \$3.25 to \$4. Plain vealers sold around \$5 and medium to medium good up to \$6 with a few good veals at \$6.50. Lambs were \$8 for good kinds with bulls out at \$6. Sheep were \$2.50 to \$3.25. Hogs ranged from \$9.75 to \$9.85 for bacon, fed and watered. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium while butchers, heavies and lights were cut 50 cents per hundred-weight and extra heavies \$1 per hundredweight. Sows were \$6.50 to \$7.

NOTICE RE LIGHTS ON HORSE DRAWN VEHICLES

Public notice is hereby given that under the provisions of The Highway Traffic Act 1936 the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council has proclaimed August 10th, 1936, as the day from and after which Section 21 (g) of The Highway Traffic Act shall come into force. Section 21 (g) reads as follows: (g) Every horsedrawn passenger vehicle upon a public highway shall carry after sunset and before sunrise a lamp or reflector at the back of said vehicle casting a red light clearly visible under the headlights of a motor car approaching from the rear of such vehicle with normal atmospheric conditions, at a distance of not less than 400 feet in the rear of the vehicle. This sub-section (9) shall come into force on a date to be fixed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council. P. S. FIELDING, Deputy Provincial Secretary.
