Monthly Meeting Of Local C. W. L.

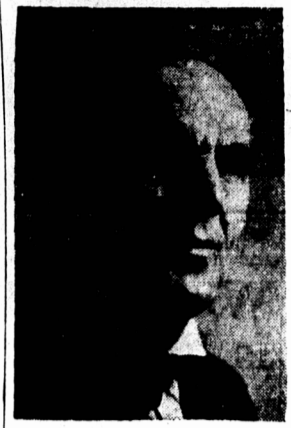
The regular monthly meeting of the Charlottetown Sub-division C. W. L. was held Tuesday evening at 8 p. m. in their newly decorated hall.

It is difficult to make a general recommendation for the best and safest method of handling the potato fields at the present time, the problem varying considerably from one farm to another, states the latest bulletin issued by the Potato Growers Advisory Committee.

Preliminary deck-clearing work has commenced on the mine-sweepers "Malpeque" and "Westmount", which are tied up at Bruce, Stewart and Company wharf. The ships were brought to Charlottetown this summer under a \$12,000,000 programme for the conversion and refitting of 34 frigates and mine-sweepers, to be done in the next two years by shipyards in the Maritimes and the St. Lawrence area.

No Offensive Threat

Japan, he said, would not constitute an offensive threat, but its forces, together with those of other nations, "would provide mutual security against threats to the independence of the nations of the Pacific, including Japan."

Question of Preparations

Truman said the treaty recognizes the principle that Japan should make reparations to the countries which suffered from its aggression without saddling her people "with a hopeless burden of reparations which would crush their economy in the years to come."
