SOUTHPORT FERRY.

Mr. Editor.—As our wise men will soon be met together I would call their attention to the management of the Southport ferry. It is claimed that this ferry is run at a loss. Now this should not be so. Where there is such an immense traffic, it should pay expenses if properly managed. To my mind the greatest cause for the deficit is to be attributed to the system of season tickets. These should be abolished, and let every person who wishes to cross pay for it every time. But as it stands now, the fare is altogether too high. Instead of 14 cents as at present for a return trip, make it 10 cents return for a horse and wagon, cart, or truck, and driver, and two cents each way for foot passengers. Some contend that a man that goes to town often, should not pay as much as one who only goes occasionally. Why should he not? He has the advantage of living near town, and takes his products to market, and makes his money in this way; as in the case of the butcher, market gardener and truck farmer; and why should he not pay for the accommodation? There are people who get season tickets who go to town when they haven't any business to take then there, and loaf around all day when they would be better at home doing something useful about the farm or attending to their business, simply because they have next thing to a free ticket and they want to take all they can out of it; fact. There is another matter that causes a great deal of talk and had feeling, and should be remedied. A load of hay, a cart of potatoes or a load of bricks pays 14c. But for a light wagon and two persons in it they have to pay the 14c and buy a foot passenger's ticket besides, then get in their buggy and go across. This should be changed to one person or two in a wagon, one fare.
I feel assured if the Government would do away with season tickets, lower the fares, and let every man pay for his accommodation, there would be a better showing at the end of the year. I may say that I cross the ferry about as often as anyone, and often felt guilty, getting so many free trips,—so that I know whereof I speak. And also let the Government see to it, that we have two boats on in the fall on market days.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—
1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for general civic purposes under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and of all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein, made and duly returned by them on the twenty-first day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of assessment on Personal Property for such general civic purposes, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of seven-eighths of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them on the twenty-first day of March, A. D. 1899.

A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property and Poll in the City of Charlottetown for a Waterworks Fund, under Statute 50th Victoria, Chapter 8.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—
1st. The rate of Assessment on Real Estate or a Waterworks Fund under said Statute for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the general Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein made and duly returned by them on the twenty-first day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of Assessment on Personal Property for such Water Works Fund for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

3rd. The amount of Poll Tax to be paid by every person returned by the said Assessors in said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll as liable thereto for such Water works Fund under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the 31st day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the sum of Ten Cents (10c) on the poll of every person so assessed and returned as aforesaid.

A By-law for allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes for the current year ending the thirty-first day of December A. D. 1899.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—
1st. A discount at the rate of Two and One-half Per Cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the Fifteenth day of July next, A. D. 1899, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Personal Property for civic purposes.

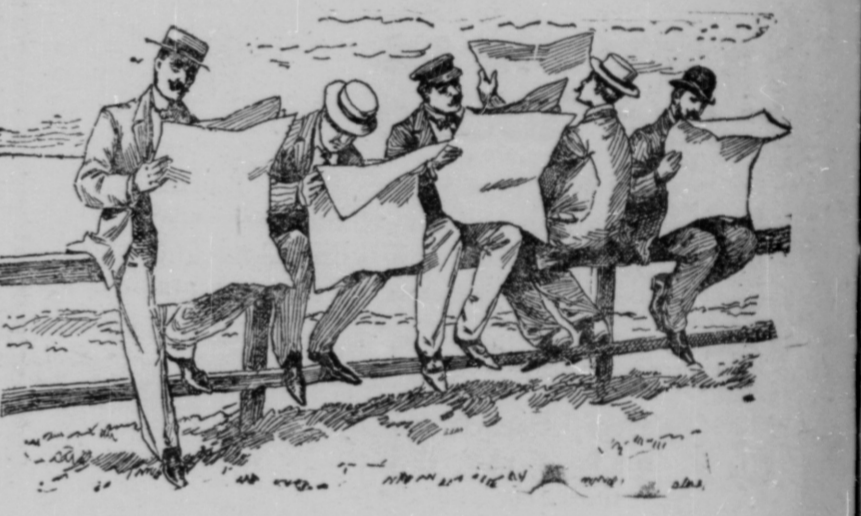

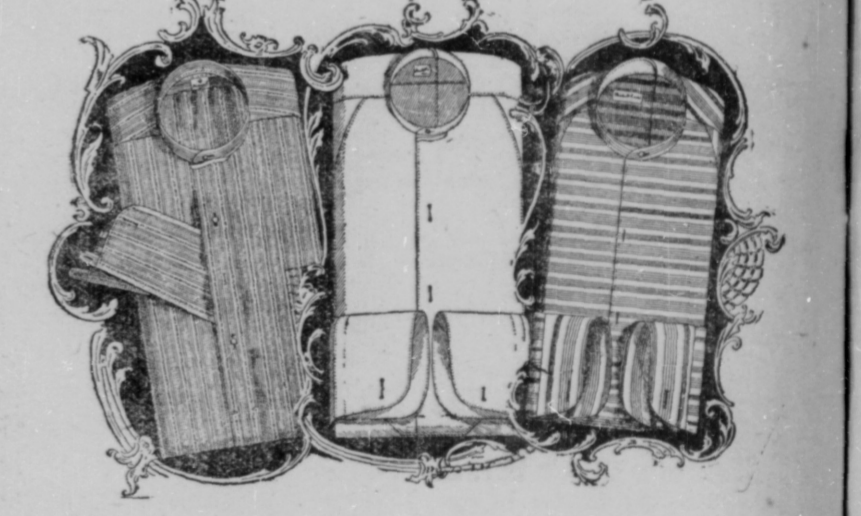
