

Manitoba And N. S. Only Unbeaten Rinks At Dominion 'Spiel

WINNIPEG, March 3 (CP)—The list of the unbeaten was cut to two tonight as Manitoba downed Ontario and Nova Scotia beat Saskatchewan in the fourth round of the Canadian curling championship. Manitoba now has four wins and no defeats; Nova Scotia has three wins and no losses.

Prior to tonight's 9-7 loss to Manitoba, Ontario's Dr. J. R. Clark of Peterborough had won both his starts. Nova Scotia had little trouble in its match, drubbing the West-erners 15-6.

In other games, Alberta went into a tie with Ontario for third place — each with two wins and one loss — by defeating Northern Ontario, 11-6; Quebec defeated the winless Newfoundland rink, 9-4; and British Columbia defeated Prince Edward Island, 17-10.

There were no games scheduled for tonight, with the curlers taking in their annual banquet. The Dominion Curling Association holds its annual meeting tomorrow morning, then the curlers get back into action tomorrow afternoon, with the fifth draw at 4 P. M. E. S. T.

Jake LaMotta Sure of Win In Bout Tonight

DETROIT, March 4 (AP)—Burley Jake LaMotta was so sure of himself today he said he would quit the ring if he "decisively" lost his bout here Wednesday night with Eugene (Silent) Halston.

"I'll retire—definitely!—if he beats me decisively," said the bull-dogged boxer from the Bronx. "But that's barring accidents," he warned. "Like a butt or an eye out."

But the swarthy, 30-year-old battler made it clear he's entertaining no thoughts of losing.

"I feel good," he said. "I'm strong, I've had lots of work. I feel real good and I've got no excuses."

In fact, LaMotta, in the usual role of underdog at 9 to 5, planned a decisive win, himself, for his 99th fight. The scrap will be broadcast and telecast.

"The I. B. C. (International Boxing Commission) promised me Turpin if I win this one," he declared, lounging in his hotel suite awaiting the bout. Randy Turpin, the rugged Britain, won and lost the middleweight title last year from Sugar Ray Robinson, two-time conqueror of LaMotta.

The odds, 6 to 5 all week, were high in favor of Halston on the theory that Halston's body attack would wear LaMotta down.

Such an eventuality might close LaMotta's colorful 12-year ring career, and threaten the Bronx Bull's boast of never having been knocked off his feet.

LaMotta bristled when questioned about his boast.

"A thousand dollars to anyone who can show proof I've been knocked off my feet in any of my pro fights," he snapped. "Though he admitted he was 'numb' when Robinson beat him to a bloody pulp in the title fight in Chicago last year.

"I was too tight for that one," he said. "I was supposed to get a return bout with Robinson but I couldn't make the weight. And Robinson refused to fight me at anything but 160 pounds."

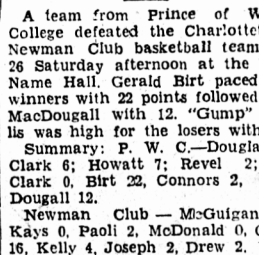
P. W. C. Defeats Newman Club In Hoop Game

Race Horses Can Be Moved From Canada To U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 4 (AP)—Race horses can be moved from Canada to the United States despite the outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in Canada.

Horses are exempted from the Agriculture Department's ban on importing livestock from Canada. They are not subject to the disease which attacks cloven-hoofed animals.

However, officials said today that the Department will require that vans and other vehicles used to transport race horses be disinfected at the U. S. border.

Hay and straw may not be brought into this country with horses. They can harbor the foot-and-mouth virus.

Any straw or hay in a race van will have to be burned.

MONTREAL, March 4 (CP)—Sandy Saddler, world featherweight champion was fined \$500 and his purse released today by the Montreal Athletic Commission as a result of last night's fight between Saddler and Armand Savoie of Montreal in which Saddler was disqualified.

Emile Gauthier, Commission chairman, announced after a special meeting that "if it was an ordinary time we would suspend Saddler."

"Due to the fact that he is going into the United States army—and we like to see a man doing his duty for his country—we will give him a chance to make his living; we will not suspend him."

Saddler was disqualified just before the fourth round of the bout started last night. Gauthier climbed to the apron of the ring and told referee Tommy Sullivan to stop the fight.

Sullivan halted it and the decision was awarded to Savoie, Canadian lightweight champion. The bout was a non-title affair.

Campbell Gets Winning Goal As St. Mary's Edge Glace Bay 4-3

HALIFAX, March 4 (CP)—Hughie Campbell's goal, with a little more than two minutes left in the third period, broke a 3-3 tie and gave Halifax St. Mary's a 4-3 win over Glace Bay Miners in a Maritime Major Hockey League here tonight.

Saints' victory boosted them four points ahead of third-place Charlottetown Islanders.

In a fast, wide open game, highlighted by the brilliant net-minding of Miners' Bob Arnell, the Saints had a big edge in the last two periods.

They were outplayed in the first chapter that ended 1-1, came back to outscore Miners 2-1 in the second, then split a pair in the third.

Arnell was the outstanding player on the ice. In the second and third frames, when Halifax first a total of 41 shots at his citadel, Arnell was the player who kept the Miners within range.

Some of the saves he made, and they were all tough, bordered on the impossible. The shots that hit gave him no chance. Jimmy Strachan had a hot time in the first period but the pressure eased in the last two frames.

Veterans Pete Wywrot and Hub Macey turned in a top display up front. Macey collected two of the Glace Bay goals and Wywrot, while failing to connect in the scoring column, made things miserable for the Halifax defenders all night. Twice in the third period, the leading Glace Bay forwards hit the post with shots that had Strachan beaten. Anderson netted the other Glace Bay goal.

Hughie Campbell, along with his winning marker, picked up a second period tally also. Billy Watson and Pete Leswick were the other Halifax scorers. Watson picked up two assists, both on Campbell's goals to move closer to the league's scoring leaders. Bob Drainville and Danny Nixon each had a pair of assists.
