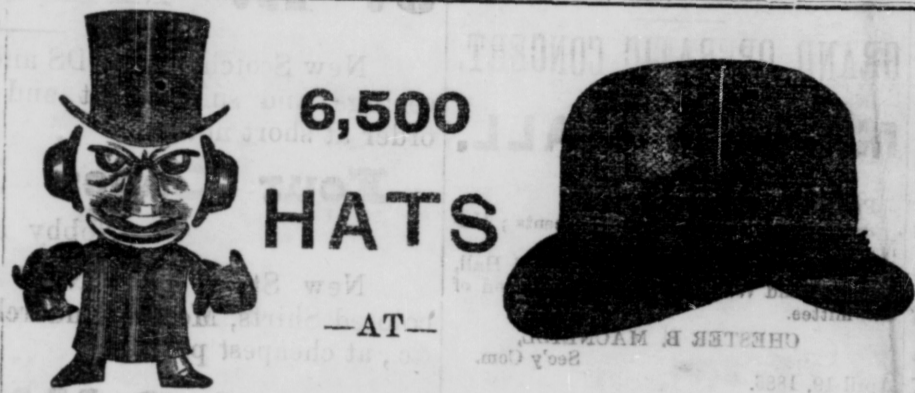

### A Fight in a Ship's Hold

United States Consul Withers, stationed at Hong Kong, sends to the United States Department a thrilling extract from the log of the ship Granite State, of Portsmouth, N. H. It relates to the death of a Spanish sailor, Leon Salares, who was taken on at Manila and who was rebellious and troublesome from the first. The extract reads as follows: "After dinner called all hands to break out cargo in the lower hold to find a seaman named Leon Salares, who had for the second time gone into the lower hold, where nothing but kerosene oil was stowed. This time he was well armed with sheath knives, fastened to long poles, and positively refused to come up. During the last night he has had a fight among the oil several times. He also threatens to burn the ship if he is not supplied with food and water. Have tried by all known means to get him to come up; have tried by promises to excuse him from all work; have tried also to capture him without harm to himself or anybody else, but he has assaulted several of the men, wounding them severely. The chief officer he struck by throwing fire-wood at him. It was impossible to reach him where he was stowed without lanterns, and a naked light was dangerous. He threw firewood at the lanterns and broke the glass. All the crew and officers being anxious to secure him before another night of suspense, and the weather being rainy and squally so that the hatches had to be put down, and the cases of oil were all adrift, determined to capture him for his own safety, and that of the ship and cargo and all on board. Gave orders to the men to secure him and defend themselves from violence, as he was a dangerous and desperate man. After four hours work captured him alive, wounded in the mouth and left arm. He died ten minutes after being taken up. Appearance indicate suicide, as there is a clean cut under his left ear, which must have been made by a sharp instrument. Washed the body, sewed it up carefully, love the ship to, read the funeral service for the dead, set the flag at half-mast and buried Leon Salares. All feel greatly relieved to know that he is up from the cargo. Signed by Thomas Fritz, master, and all the officers and crew."

### A Boy Burglar.

The Montreal police have unearthed a phenomenon. For the past six weeks they have been looking for a band of New York burglars, believed by them to be operating on retail houses in the eastern part of the city. The supposed burglars baffled them, and stores with burglar automatic alarms fared no better than the rest. One cute detective heard the story of a boy's doings from some companion, and he arrested Joseph Landry, a perfect child in appearance. He is thirteen years old, but being very slight does not look more than nine. He burglarized stores as easily as playing marbles. On one occasion he heard the burglar alarm ringing while at work, but continued on, as he knew the parties were at church. At another time he entered a store through bars six inches apart. Money was his first choice, but when he couldn't find that, silks and jewelry were taken. He chose Sunday for his operations generally, and in the course of six weeks cracked successfully eleven stores. When taken out of bed at five o'clock in the morning he denied his guilt until the officers found stolen silks and other goods hidden in the room. He not only had kept out of the clutches of the officers, but had hidden his booty so deftly in his father's house that none but himself was aware of its presence. His love for whiskey and a fast horse had given other boys too much knowledge of his doings, or the police might have been still looking for the "gang of New York burglars."

was the setting on fire of a passing load of hay, whereby the farmer sitting on top of it was nearly burned to death.

### The guaranteed salary, the last collections and private subscriptions made up \$3,000 each for Sam Jones and Sam Small for their four weeks' revival works in Chicago.

Cardinal Manning has expressed himself in opposition to that feature of Mr. Gladstone's bill which excludes Irish representatives from sitting at Westminster.

### Sir William Whiteway has entered an action against the government of Newfoundland for \$20,000 for services in connection with the Halifax fishery award.

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### A recent calculation shows that England owns nearly three times as large an extent of colonies as the rest of Europe together. Her colonies are eighty-five times as big as the mother country.

The petrified skeleton of a whale over thirty feet long has been discovered by an officer of the Coast Survey, on a range of mountains in Monterey County, Cal., over 3,300 feet above the sea level.

### Dr. B. H. Warner, a young physician of Baltimore, died of hydrophobia last Tuesday morning, after suffering horrible agonies since the previous Friday. He was bitten by a dog last Christmas morning.

Henry Ward Beecher says there are two poisons in the organization of the Knights of Labor which tend to disruption and must be eliminated—the boycott and the treatment of men not members of the organization.

### Patrick Dunn, of Glasgow, Scotland, who was sentenced to seven years' imprisonment for connection with the blowing up of the gasometer with dynamite, has been released from prison. His health is completely shattered.

A farmer in the west being visited by robbers, and having no shot for his gun for their appropriate reception, put in a box of pills. The outside application resulted in the death of one of the intruders and the serious wounding of another.

### The New York Nation gives some interesting figures showing the age at which men of real ability are likely to manifest their force. When the civil war broke out in 1861, Lincoln, Hamlin and Andrew Johnson were each 52 years old; Fremont and Douglas were each 48; Seward was 60; Chase, 53; Cameron, 62; Stanton, 46; Greeley and Sumner each 50; Wilson, 49; Fessenden, 55; Trumbull, 48; Wade, 61; "Thad" Stevens, 69; Banks, 45; Hendricks, 42; Curtin, 44; John Sherman, Morton and Colfax each 38; Grant, 39; Tecumseh Sherman, 41; McClellan, 34; Hancock, 37; Sheridan, 30; Seymour, 51; Tilden, 57; Hayes, 38; Garfield, 29; Logan, 35; Lamar, 36. Here are thirty-three men, then prominent in politics, or destined to prominence in the field, of whom a full third had completed their 50th year. Even cutting down the figures by introduction in the list of a few younger men who did not become prominent at once, the average is about 46 years. In America from 46 to, say, 66, is the time when most men make their records.

Montreal is arranging to build a smallpox hospital.

The Crown Prince Frederick William is ill with measles.

Peter Kelly, of Hagersville, is the father of 24 children.

Japan, according to the new census, has a population of 28,500,000.

Europe is stated to have an available military force of 9,000,000 soldiers.

About 200,000 seals have already been taken into Newfoundland by steamers and vessels.

Daniel Arnold, of Macon, Ga., hid his savings (\$700) in a hole near his house, but a recent flood inundated the hole and carried away Dan's wealth.

Swedish papers are talking of a possible match between Prince Oscar Charles, second son of the King of Sweden, and the Princess Louise of Wales.

Esther Dow, of Deerfield, N. H., who recently died, aged 88 years, had never in her life seen a railway train, and for years had not been off her farm.

The Governor-General, so the Quebec papers say, will spend a portion of the summer at the citadel. Preparations for his reception are being made.

An intelligent Nebraska jury recently rendered the following verdict: "We find in favor of the plaintiff, and render a verdict in favor of the defendant for \$10."

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
