Parlor Organs, Bird Baths, On Auction

If you're fascinated by kooky old things, works of art and items of beauty for your home, this afternoon's auction sale at Confederation Centre's Memorial Hall will delight you.

The sale is being run by the Women's Committee of the Confederation Art Gallery. This year, the organizers have drawn up an extensive descriptive catalogue of the 143 items up for bidding, and labelled them "modern", "old", "very old" and "antique"—the last term applying only to articles at least one hundred years old.

Most of the donations have been made by individuals, but R. T. Holman Ltd. has given a kitchen chrome set, the Antic Fair, a pine desk and a china jug and washbowl set.

Proceeds from the sale will be used to build the Women's Committee's collection of works by Canadian artists for distribution first to Charlottetown schools and later, as the collection grows, to schools throughout the province.

The display of goods will be open to the public today from noon on, with cake and side table sales beginning at 1:30 p.m. and the auction proper set to begin at 2 o'clock.

Berry Season Means Work To Take Over N.W.T. Post

The strawberry picking season, now in full swing, means a busy time ahead for the staff of the National Employment Service Office in Charlottetown and particularly for Joan Strain. It is through the NES that the various growers get their help and this involves many hours of overtime work for the office.

Miss Strain said yesterday that there are hundreds of pickers now working in the strawberry fields and it has been her responsibility to find these boys and girls.

Most of the pickers are between 13 and 15 years of age but some are as young as 10. Earlier this spring the NES advertised in the schools for boys and girls who wished to earn some money by berry picking and a large number of young teens were registered. Most of the pickers, Miss Strain said, are girls and it is girls that the

Edmonton Judge Is Expected To Take Over N.W.T. Post

OTTAWA (CP) - One of Judge John H. Sissons' greatest achievements is expected to succeed him as territorial judge of the Northwest Territories, say William Morrow, 49, of Edmonton, will be named to the post left vacant upon the retirement of Judge Sissons July 15.

A member of the bars of the Yukon and N.W.T., Mr. Morrow is no stranger to Ottawa where he has argued several cases involving Eskimo and Indian hunting rights before the Supreme Court of Canada.

In all of them, he has opposed the Crown and defended decisions made by Judge Sissons who had taken the edge off the white man's law and applied it against a background of sympathy for the Eskimos and a belief that the federal government was running the Canadian North like a colony.

Although the Supreme Court has overruled several important decisions of Judge Sissons, Mr. Morrow raised respect among court officials for his defenses of them.
