

India Missionary Is Guest Speaker

ALBERTON — Rev. Douglas Jennings, missionary on furlough from India, was greeted by a large congregation at Alberion United Church yesterday morning when he spoke at the UCV thanksgiving service.

As Mr. Jennings told of ways in which the Christian Church is attempting to serve some of India's tremendous need, he said the work of a missionary is to witness to the things that God is doing. He is the mighty God who created the world, and is lord of that world. He sees human need, want, depravity and desolation with the heart of a loving father.

He made particular mention of the need for agricultural missionaries in India, men who will help the poorer people to grow better crops and raise better livestock, so there will be sufficient food for all. At the present time there is no agricultural missionary in the area where Mr. Jennings is serving and he is spending part of his furlough year in study at the Agricultural College in Truro, so that he may be partially equipped to give leadership in this field.

Sunday morning's worship service was conducted by Mrs. Wendell Weeks, president of the UCV assisted by Mrs. James MacNeill who led in prayer. The offering was received by Mrs. Wesley Hardy and Mrs. Gordon Warren.

103 Donors At Final Clinic

ELLERSLIE — 103 donors registered at the concluding session of last week's four days of Red Cross blood donor clinics which was held at the Royal Canadian Legion Home in Ellerslie on Thursday evening.

Wendell C. MacKay, chairman of the committee for the Ellerslie Legion Branch, which sponsored this clinic, expressed his gratification at the fact that there were 24 more donors in attendance in comparison with the number who responded last year. He said he felt there could be a still larger turnout another year, though he intimated that the quota of 180 was rather high for the area. (The quotas for every centre in the province are set on the same basis—40 an hour for morning or afternoon clinics, 75 an hour for evening clinics—in order to provide a fair basis for comparison in the "Manning Trophy" competition, according to provincial Red Cross officials.)

Members of the Ellerslie Legion Ladies' Auxiliary provided the refreshments for the donors, and the voluntary assistants for the mobile Red Cross blood donor team, while surams from the Stewart Memorial community hospital looked after the rest beds.

25 Cases Heard In City Court

City magistrates court had an especially heavy docket Saturday morning. Magistrate A.J. Haslam QC had 25 cases to deal with.

John Charles Burke, Charlottetown was remanded for a week on a charge of dangerous driving. He was arrested by city police after he was alleged to have driven through Charlottetown, at speeds in excess of 80 mph.

Frederick Scott, Charlottetown, was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days for leaving the scene of an accident.

Ronald Cudmore, Charlottetown, was remanded to Dec. 3rd on a charge of leaving the scene of an accident.

Collin Rae MacFadyen was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days for driving without due care and attention.

David Darrach pleaded not guilty to a charge of theft under \$50 and had his case remanded to Dec. 3rd.


Three city residents appeared on a charge of disorderly conduct, two were fined \$15 and costs and one case was remanded to Dec. 3rd.

Ten cases of drunk and incapable were dealt with. Three received 30-day suspended sentences, one, 30 days in jail and the remainder were given fines ranging from \$10 to \$20.
