

FREE TRANSPORTATION.

Freight For Exhibition Purposes.

Mr. F. L. Hazard, President of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association, returned from Ottawa last night where he, Attorney-General Longley, President of the Nova Scotia Exhibition Association, C. A. Everett, President of the St. John, N. B. Exhibition Association, James Reynolds, a director of the St. John Association, and Mr. Elderkin, President of the Stock Breeders' Association, have been to wait upon the Hon. Mr. Blair, Minister of Railways, to ask him to direct that exhibits be carried to and from the places of exhibition on the government railways free of charge. The Liberal members of the three provinces accompanied the delegates. They pointed out the good work these exhibitions were accomplishing in the interest of the farmers and the public generally, and of the desirability of their being assisted by the government in the direction mentioned. It was of particular importance, the delegates held, that cattle should be carried free. This would insure good exhibits of stock, which are not only essential to a good exhibition but very desirable in the interests of the agriculture community and would have excellent results in improving the quality and purity of the animals.

Mr. Blair was greatly impressed with the request of the delegates and promised to take the matter into his serious consideration. The minister states that in the past certain railway concessions were given to exhibitors but he has now decided to give free transports to and from the principal exhibitions for any exhibits that are not sold. The principal exhibitions are those of St. John, Halifax and Charlottetown.

The quarterly meeting of the Presbytery was held in Zion Church this morning, and was largely attended by ministers and elders. A number of communications from different Presbyteries concerning reception of ministers at the forthcoming Assembly were read. Edwin Smith was sustained and arrangements were made for his induction at Kensington on Thursday, May 31st, at 2 p. m., Mr. McIntosh to preach, Mr. Smith to address the minister and Mr. Fisher the people.
